President's Message


Last month, I talked a bit about the <u>CU Anschutz Medical Campus</u>. Below is (the final) **Part III** of my discussion, again from my perspective, of the University of Colorado Boulder campus.



CU-Boulder is the flagship institution for the state; its comprehensiveness is recognized by inclusion in the Association of American Universities (AAU)—an organization of 62 prominent public and private research universities in the US and Canada. As I mentioned last month, Boulder is the campus with which we're all probably most familiar.

- The College of Music offers an abundance of 'listening' (and visual) opportunities. The Artist Series goes from fall thru spring and is varied in the programs it brings on campus. The resident Takacs Quartet is so popular that it's hard to obtain tickets. The Jazz program prospers with both Ensembles (bigger band) and Combos performances. And the free Faculty Tuesday concerts during the school year in the evenings, featuring Boulder faculty, are often not to be missed.
- Boulder's Museum of Natural History on campus is a gem. My young grandkids love it and the special weekend children's programs that they have. Their director, Patrick Kociolek, is a very creative fellow. He came to us from the California Academy of Sciences where he led their construction of a marvelous Renzo Piano building.
- The Conference on World Affairs has been a springtime highlight on campus for decades. Each year 'the conference' hosts over 100 international speakers and conducts over 200 sessions during the week-long event. Panelists are unpaid, are a part of 5-7 panel sessions over the week, and stay with local 'housers.' There is much interaction among themselves and with the community. Moderators of the many panels (on all sorts of topics) come from the Boulder area.
- The Center of the American West is within the College of Arts & Sciences. It "takes as its mission the creation of forums for the respectful exchange of ideas and perspectives in the pursuit of solutions to the regions difficulties." It sponsors important series and speakers for the community on such topics as the Secretaries of the Interior, Modern Indian Identity, our lands, energy needs, and water. Patty Limerick, a historian and recipient of a MacArthur Fellowship, leads the Center and provides an opportunity for it to take part in important regional and national dialogues.
- Certainly, one of our claims to fame is the relationship that the campus has to the national labs in/around Boulder. Many members of the UWC have close associations with these entities— NCAR, NIST and NOAA. NREL is nearby in Golden, CO. (I'll let you look up their full names on your own.) The scientists in these labs frequently have joint appointments at the university. The labs provide rich experiences for faculty and graduate students and are a source of employment for graduates.
- There are now 11 separate research institutes on campus which deal in every scientific area imaginable—the environment; behavioral genetics; behavioral and cognitive science; atmospheric and space physics; standards and technology; renewable and sustainable energy; biotechnology; and technology, learning and society. These research institutes account for over half of the sponsored research funding coming to the campus annually—last year that amount was ~\$380M (over \$800M for the system as a whole).
- The campus is a top provider of Peace Corps volunteers among all US colleges and universities. CU-Boulder students are an adventurous bunch.

The fact that we are members in the UWC entitles us to purchase a Buff OneCard that lets us eat in university dining services facilities, at a discount, after we 'put' money on the card—to me, that means the UMC cafeteria or C4C (the Center for Community, which has terrific food). The card also entitles us to use the Norlin Library on site (but not off-campus remotely). It is tied to a CU email account, which we can use or not, as we choose. Interested members should contact Kathleen Salzberg. UWC members are 'sponsored' for a year at a time. Cards need to be renewed annually for \$5, and Kathleen needs to notify OIT and verify that the interested person is still a member, and thus eligible for the associated email account and related privileges, by October 31 each year. (There may have been a statement in an earlier issue of MESSAGES regarding this option, as well.)

There is an emphasis on all four of our campuses on being collaborative across units, and it's a goal for the system to work together--across campuses. A good example here is biotech, where all four campuses are involved in complementary ways in this initiative. Headquartered in Boulder at the BioFrontiers Institute on the East Campus, what happens on each campus and as a composite has much importance for the university, the region, the state and our nation.

It's convenient to look at what fundamentally happens on all of the campuses, which are varied and diverse, as consisting of four pillars—Learning & Teaching, Discovery & Innovation, Community & Culture, and Health & Wellness. They represent the central things that are happening at CU--programs can fit into single or multiples of these categories. This was the thinking about the university that evolved as the staff of the CU Foundation was planning the *Creating Futures* system-wide capital campaign which is currently in progress.

It's important for us to remember that the overall annual economic impact of the University of Colorado on the state of Colorado is over \$5B. And new companies are constantly being established based on CU faculty discoveries. Our university is a pretty special place.

Tips for Spring Gardeners

We asked our Scholarship Luncheon speaker, Hannah Upham, to provide us with some gardening tips.

It's April and time to:

- divide perennial plants
- plant cooler annuals like alyssum and petunias and diascia
- plant perennials
- clean out pots for annual planting
- mulch and check irrigation for water conservation

Spring Planting March 15-April 15:

- **Seed:** Beets, Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, Carrots, Cauliflower, Chard, Kale, Kohlrabi, Leeks, Lettuce, Onions, Parsnip, Peas, Pod Peas, Radishes, Rutabaga, Spinach, Turnips
- Roots, tubers, plants: Asparagus Roots, Garlic Cloves, Onion Sets, Seed Potatoes, Rhubarb Burls, Shallots, and Strawberry Plants



Honors Tea ...and Margaret Willard

Margaret Willard began her career at CU as an English Instructor. The wife of a history professor, she became the first president of the Faculty Wives' Club which has evolved into a more encompassing group, our University Women's Club. Though the original group liked to chat and sip tea, they grew in involvement in philanthropic matters.

According to Sylvia Pettem, local historian, these included providing eye-glasses and books to needy students, milk funds for schools, implementing a student loan program, and more. The social aspects of the Faculty Wives turned more and more to helping others as the world progressed through the Great Depression and World War 2. By 1957, they added fund raising and expanded their philanthropic work by providing scholarships for women, non-traditional female students, who would not otherwise have been able to continue their education.

The current University Women's Club continues this tradition and recently included men for scholarship consideration. The UWC has grown to include interest and service groups, and has opened membership to all women whether they have a CU association or not.

Since 1993, in May at the UWC Honors Tea, we recognize a woman or women who exemplify the traits of our predecessors, and in doing so we honor all women. Past recipients have included Patricia Limerick, Val Havlick, Carlen Penfold, Ruth M. Wright, Claudine Garby, and Ceal Barry. All our honorees are exemplary role models who demonstrate great initiative in their endeavors, and in doing so, bring honor to all women and to the University of Colorado.


