Presenting Bob Hohlfelder CU History Department

"Antiquity in the Depths: Deepwater Archeology in the Mediterranean"

During the 20th century, marine archaeology evolved from salvage to science. Sponge divers recovering amphoras and statues from the sea were replaced by diving archaeologists trained in the use of SCUBA. With this equipment, scholars were able to explore the shallow coastal floor of the Mediterranean, confirming its richness in materials. Now more sophisticated technology has been developed for investigations in the deepest waters of the Mediterranean, a region one might call a the final frontier of explorations on earth.

Bob is a Professor of History at the University whose specialty is marine archeology in the Mediterranean, where he has done extensive research. He will give a slide lecture tracing the development of marine archaeology from its beginnings to the present, with a look ahead to tomorrow's discoveries.



"The Coldest March: New Insights Into Scott's Fatal Antarctic Expedition"

Capt. Robert Falcon Scott's tragic 1911-12 South Pole expedition has long been an Antarctic legend, viewed by some as a saga of heroism and by others as a cautionary tale of human folly. Susan Solomon, an authority on Antarctic science, presents extraordinary evidence that unusually cold weather-not failures of leadership-doomed Scott and his men.

Drawing on her recently published book, <u>The Coldest</u> <u>March</u>, Solomon will debunk other myths about the expedition, and offers new insights into the lives and deaths of Scott and his heroic companions. <u>The Coldest March</u> was published by Yale University Press in 2001. Signed copies will be available for sale after the lecture.

Susan Solomon is widely recognized as a leader in the field of atmospheric science. Since receiving her Ph.D. degree in chemistry from the University of California at Berkeley in 1981, she has been employed by NOAA as a research scientist. Her scientific papers have played a major role in explaining the reasons for ozone depletion, particularly the spectacular Antarctic ozone "hole."

In 1986 and 1987, as Head Project Scientist of the National Ozone Expedition at McMurdo Station, Antarctica, she made some of the first measurements that pointed towards chlorofluorocarbons as the cause of the ozone hole. An Antarctic glacier was named in her honor in recognition of that work.

She is a member of the U.S. National Academy of Sciences and a foreign associate of both the French and European Academies of Sciences. In March 2000, she received the National Medal of Science, the United States' highest scientific honor, for "key insights in explaining the cause of the Antarctic ozone hole."



McKenna Building Restoration

Plans are underway to restore the McKenna Building, formerly the old Women's Club Building. The building, located next to Macky Auditorium overlooking Varsity Pond, was built in 1937 with an initial gift of \$26,000 and \$31,000 from the WPA.

It was used specifically by the University Women's Club for social activities and living quarters for 16 women students. In 1947 a wing was added on to provide larger living/boarding space with 40 plus rooms for students. In 1961 the building became the Academic Language Building, home of Spanish, Portuguese, German and Slavic languages.

Constitution/By-law Additions and Changes

Constitution...

Article IV Officers Section 2. (Add) Appointed officers shall include the Chairpersons of the commit-. tees. Each chairperson may appoint an assistant chairperson who will be oriented to this appointment. The assistant chairperson will assist her with her tasks, will serve as a substitute in case the chairperson is unavailable, and will serve as the chairperson's successor for the following year.

Article V Meetings (Add) <u>Section 2. The UWC's</u> Academic year shall be June First through May Thirty-First.

Article VI Amendments Section 3. (Change/Add) The constitution and By-Laws should be reviewed every four years <u>periodically</u> by a committee... The membership shall be appraised of the proposed changes, <u>if any</u>, and...

By-Law

Article I Officers Section 1 f. (change) Each Executive Board member shall submit four (4) typewritten coies of her Annual Report, one for the outgoing incoming President...

Article VII Fiscal Year (change) The Fiscal Year shall be from June First to May Thirty First August First through July Thirty-First.

Article IX Budget (change) The Outgoing Board shall ensure that a minimum of Eight Hundred Dollers (\$800) One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00)...

Article XI Endowment Fund (Add) Section 1. In 1982 the University Women's Club created a Scholarship to encourage women over the age of 24 who have interrupted their education to return to the University to complete their degrees. Section 2. Funding comes from individual donations, fundraising events, and from the UWC's Endowment Fund. The latter is supervised by the University Foundation.

Section 3. The Endowment Fund will be used for Scholarships.

Section 4. The UWC annual budget should include a specified amount for donating money to its Endowment Fund.




