Stewart M. Hoover

"Religion, Politics, and the Media Age"

Stewart Hoover is Professor of Media Studies in of Journalism the School and Mass Communication at the University of Colorado-Boulder, and is a Professor Adjunct of Religious Studies and American Studies. An internationally known scholar of religion and media, Dr. Hoover is the author of Mass Media Religion: The Social Sources of the Electronic Church; Religion in the News: Faith and Journalism in American Public Discourse; and the forthcoming Religion in the Media Age.

Professor Hoover will discuss the way that religion, media, and politics have come to interact in contemporary life. In the post-9/11 era, this landscape is changed, with important implications for domestic and international affairs. In the media age, individuals, groups, and movements increasingly see the media as a prime context for negotiation and struggle over values, ideals, symbols, and identity. This PowerPoint presentation will explore these issues both nationally and internationally.

"Genocide in Burma—No Human Being is Illegal"

Both speakers are experienced teachers: Rose is on the board of Burma Lifeline and teaches at "Your English School" in Boulder. Phyllis is a substitute teacher and a Victim Advocate.

Since 1962 the people of Burma have lived under a military dictatorship that has destroyed their economy and made living there a nightmare. The minorities in Burma have been especially targeted with abuses including rape, torture, and murder. Because of this, more than one million people have fled Burma and have crossed the border into Thailand.

Rose Marie and Phyllis spent three months recently in Thailand teaching English to three groups of Shan students in secret locations. Thai authorities consider them illegal immigrants. Their stories are sad but their outlook remains hopeful. Their wish is to return one day to a free and democratic Burma. How they are preparing for that day is their remarkable story.

Kevin Trenberth

"Drought and Global Climate Change: Was 2002 a Glimpse of the Future?"

Dr. Kevin E. Trenberth is Head of the Climate Analysis Section at the National Center for Atmospheric Research. Lead author of the 2001 IPCC Scientific Assessment of Climate Change, Dr. Trenberth received the NCAR Distinguished Achievement Award in 2003. You may have heard him interviewed on NPR.

It is now well established that increases in atmospheric greenhouse gases are the primary mechanism through which humans have already affected climate. The popular term for this is "global warming," but global heating is a more general term of which one consequence is a global temperature increase. In the mountains, global heating systematically reduces snow pack and thus soil moisture in summer increasing risk of heat waves and wild fire. Accelerated drying and additional atmospheric water vapor affects the frequency and severity of droughts and excessive precipitation events.

Dr. Trenberth's PowerPoint presentation will illustrate the evidence for human climate change and what the consequences may be.

Auditing Classes at CU-An Inexpensive Way to Attend Classes on the Boulder Campus

The Senior Citizens Auditors Program, sponsored by the CU-Boulder Alumni Association, is available to all Colorado residents 55 and older on a space-available basis. Permission of the instructor or professor is required. You do not receive credit for auditing and are not required to take the tests.

A Registration Handbook that contains the schedule of course offerings for Fall 2004 may be purchased for \$3.00 at either the Registrar's Office in Regent Hall (on Regent Drive east of Broadway) or at the CU Book Store in the UMC. Classes begin Monday, August 23, and auditors are advised to visit the class or classes of interest that week to see whether the instructor will give permission to audit. If permission is granted, the next step is to register.

Registration is at the Koenig Alumni Center, at the southeast corner of University and Broadway. Registration hours are Monday, August 30, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and Tuesday, August 31, from 9:00 a.m. to Noon. Cost for auditing per class is \$5.00 if you are a CU Alumni Association member, otherwise it is \$40.

Note: Because of the high cost of printing, this is the last semester that CU will be publishing the Registration Handbook in hard copy. The Handbook will be only web-based beginning with the Spring 2005 issue.

"Drought and Global Climate Change: Was 2002 a Glimpse of the Future?"

Dr. Kevin E. Trenberth is Head of the Climate Analysis Section at the National Center for Atmospheric Research. Lead author of the 2001 IPCC Scientific Assessment of Climate Change, Dr. Trenberth received the NCAR Distinguished Achievement Award in 2003.

Increases in atmospheric greenhouse gases are the primary mechanism through which humans have already affected climate. The popular term for this is "global warming," but this has more than one consequence. Dr. Trenberth's PowerPoint presentation will illustrate the evidence for human climate change and what these consequences may be.

ANNOUNCING A NEW SERVICE PROJECT

This fall, UWC is launching a unique service program aimed at helping international women who are students, wives of students, or visiting faculty to adapt to life in Boulder. Members who have experienced life on a foreign campus will have a special understanding for the problems faced by these women, and all members who choose to become involved should find the project stimulating and rewarding.

Newcomers have a steep learning curve to adapt to life in a foreign country. It's not enough to know the language; they are confronted every day with a whole new way of living! Our intent will be to help these women cope with practical everyday tasks like shopping, getting medical help, dealing with our monetary system, and getting about Boulder and Denver by bus; learning about American culture by visiting art galleries, attending concerts, and plays; and becoming familiar with the unique amenities and qualities that define Boulder. It would be our goal that they return to their respective homelands as positive cultural ambassadors for Colorado and the U.S.

Participation will involve a commitment of two- to four-person teams to *just one session each year*. Teams will be able to select from a list of suggested topics or identify one of their own, and each team will be free to develop whatever format they'd prefer: classroom situation, private home, or field trip. The bottom line is that each team provides a worthwhile service and enjoys doing it.

Our proposal has the enthusiastic support of the Office of International Student and Scholar Services, the Family Housing Office, and the International English Center at C.U., and YES!. These agencies have all agreed to facilitate our meetings and to help publicize our program on campus.

Most sessions should be relatively straightforward to organize because they're part of our everyday routines. Some sessions could be conducted in less than two hours, while others (like shopping trips) might require half-day commitments. We believe that this program has the potential to build esprit de corps within our group as well as to foster goodwill among our visitors from abroad, and we hope that many of you will choose to become involved in it.

Genocide in Burma—No Human Being is Illegal

Rose Marie and Phyllis have had many years of teaching experience in New York and Connecticut. Rose 's specialty was in Remedial Reading and English as a Second Language. Phyllis was a Biology teacher who spent a year in South Africa working in seven different departments of a Johannesburg hospital. Rose is on the board of Burma Lifeline and teaches at Your English School in Boulder. Phyllis is an active substitute teacher in three local districts and also volunteers as a Victim Advocate in the emergency room at Boulder Community Hospital.

Rose Marie and Phyllis recently spent three months in Thailand teaching English to three groups of Shan students living communally in secret locations. Since 1962 the people of Burma have lived under a brutal military dictatorship that has destroyed their economy and made living there a never-ending nightmare. The minorities in Burma have been especially targeted with government abuses. They have endured rape, murder, torture, detention without trial, forced relocation, and forced labor. Because of this, more than one million people have risked all to

flee from Burma and illegally cross the border into Thailand. These Shans have been denied legal status in Thailand. Thai authorities consider them illegal immigrants—thus making them subject to exploitation and mistreatment by employees, officials, and others. Their stories are extremely sad but their outlook remains hopeful and their wish is to one day return to a free and democratic Burma. How they are preparing for that day is their remarkable story.

Dr. Kevin E. Trenberth is Head of the Climate Analysis Section at the National Center for Atmospheric Research. Lead author of the 2001 IPCC Scientific Assessment of Climate Change, Dr. Trenberth received the **NCAR** Distinguished Achievement Award in 2003. You may have heard him interviewed on NPR now well established that increases in atmospheric greenhouse gases are the primary mechanism through which humans have already affected climate. The popular term for this is "global warming," but global heating is a more general term of which one consequence is global temperature increase. In the mountains, global heating systematically reduces snowpack and thus soil moisture in summer, increasing risk of heat waves and wild fire. Accelerated drying and additional atmospheric water vapor affects the frequency and severity of droughts and excessive precipitation events.

Dr. Trenberth's PowerPoint presentation will illustrate the evidence for human climate change and what these consequences may be.

Dr. Kevin E. Trenberth is Head of the Climate Analysis Section at the National Center for Atmospheric Research (NCAR) in Boulder. Lead author of the 2001 Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) Scientific Assessment of Climate Change, Dr. Trenberth received the NCAR Distinguished Achievement Award in 2003. You may have heard him interviewed on NPR.

It is now well established that the increase in atmospheric greenhouse gases is the primary mechanism through which humans have already affected climate. The popular term for this is "global warming," but global heating is a more general term, of which one consequence is a global temperature increase.

The heating of the planet provides more energy to drive the hydrological cycle, the "air conditioner" of the planet. Heat is used for evaporation, provided that moisture is available, as it always is over the oceans, moistening the air rather than warming it. Therefore, another consequence of global heating is accelerated land-surface drying and more atmospheric water vapor (the dominant greenhouse gas). In the mountains, global heating systematically reduces the snowpack and thus soil moisture in summer, increasing risk of heatwaves and wildfire. Accelerated drying and additional atmospheric water vapor affect the frequency and severity of droughts and excessive precipitation events.

Dr. Trenberth's PowerPoint presentation will illustrate the evidence for human climate change and what the consequences may be.

He looks forward to discussing his findings and mitigation options with UWC members!

LIVING IN AMERICA Update

Living In America is picking up steam. On Tuesday, January 18, six new women joined Resident Manager Soledad Diaz and UWC members Judy Reid and Esther Magathan for a "Just Talking" INCH session. Three were from China, one was from South Korea, one was from Japan, and one was from the Navajo Nation in Arizona. Conversation ranged from discussions of American idioms to subtleties in pronouncing American English. The women became more animated as time progressed, our original conversational circle broke down into more intimate groups, and the session ended with a warm feeling of camaraderie.

All expressed enthusiasm for our program, and most of them signed up to join our next meeting—a field trip to Leanin' Tree Art Museum on January 25, which UWC member Joan Knapp will be heading. The participants carefully reviewed the list of programs already scheduled for 2005, and thoughtfully filled out questionnaires soliciting input for the future. Many interesting new topics were suggested for future programs, including "Driving Rules in the U.S., cooking techniques, how to select good TV programs, and a visit to a factory." One, who had worked as a volunteer signer translating spoken words to sign language in her homeland, requested information on daytime classes where she might learn American Sign Language so that she might continue her volunteer work here in Boulder while her husband continues his studies.

Altogether, it was the most rewarding session we have organized, and I now anticipate growing interest in our program as word of it gets around in CU's international community.



LIVING IN AMERICA Update

Interest in our Living In America program continues to grow. Our most recent session entitled "Women's Health Issues", which featured Boulder gynecologist Dr. Terri Rosenbaum, attracted eleven women who collectively represented nine different countries: Argentina, Czech Republic, Chile, China, Japan, Peru, Poland, Spain, and South Korea. Dr. Rosenbaum described in detail what happens in a typical visit to an American gynecologist's office, and made effective use of diagrams and models to explain what physicians do in the course of a standard pelvic exam. (I learned a lot myself!) She then opened the floor to an extended question-and-answer period, to which almost every woman present contributed.

Our January 25 field trip to Leanin' Tree Art Museum garnered rave reviews from Joan Knapp and Catherine Hewins, as well as from the young Asian women who signed up for it. It was led by the museum's tour coordinator, Sarah Sheldon, who effectively used her personal experiences of China to connect with the women and explain analogies with the art at Leanin' Tree. (This is definitely a "keeper" for next year!)





About Your E-Mail and DSL Connection

By now, all members with DSL (high-speed connection) and e-mail accounts with CU have heard about the change that will occur as of July 1. Unfortunately, a Qwest DSL connection through CU will no longer be possible as of this date because of a funding change at the University. Members with only e-mail accounts will not be affected.

You can change your ISP from CU to any of a number of other service providers listed at Qwest's website (Qwest.com/residential; click on Other ISPs under the DSL Overview). It is worth noting, however, that if you choose to have Qwest as your ISP, it is my understanding that you may keep your Qwest DSL service and keep your CU e-mail account. Switching to another ISP may not allow you to access your CU e-mail account through their server. If you choose to have an ISP other than Qwest, it is important that you inquire about this.

Anyone wishing to keep Qwest as their ISP should call 1-866-796-8226 and request Broadband Basic *and* Internet Basic services. Internet Basic will result in an additional monthly charge of \$9.99 but will allow you to access the server at CU for e-mail. Charges for your DSL connection will remain the same (either \$15 or \$28 per month, depending on the speed you have selected). Qwest says they will waive any fees associated with these changes. While Qwest generally requires only five business days prior to a change, they suggest allowing up to a month because of the number of people who are affected.
