UWC - A Brief History

The University Women's Club is celebrating its 90th year in 2009. Originally named the Faculty Women's Club, we first met on December 12, 1919. By 1926, there were 430 members; 185 in Boulder and 245 in Denver. Dues were \$1. Friendship, hospitality, and service were the initial goals.

Hospitality meant formal events - parties with silver, crystal, and china. Hospitality and service were combined when the club coordinated university-wide social events including for 40 years, the elaborate and very popular annual Christmas Party. Hundreds attended this festive event. Monthly UWC gatherings included a business meeting, program, and a formal tea - hats and gloves *de rigueur*.

Service projects included a 1930s student loan fund to which members donated \$1 a month. The 1948 Social Service Committee made 20 hospital gowns, 150 cancer bandages, and curtains for the City Hospital. In the 1950s, they made dolls for the TB Ward at Denver General. The UWC Scholarship was

established in 1982 and more than \$100,000 has since been awarded to 85 CU-Boulder students.

Membership. The changing role of women during these 90 years is reflected in the changing UWC membership requirements. In 1924, membership was limited to faculty wives and female faculty members. 1942 and WW II raised the controversial question of whether wives of Japanese Language School faculty could be members - a reluctant yes. The 1960s saw membership extended to wives of men with professional privileges, professional women, and female university staff, and finally today "women who are friends of the University Community."

Interest Groups. The 1930s saw the first interest group - a Drama Club. There were four interest groups in 1952 including a garden club, marionette group, music appreciation group, and bridge group. In 1956, sewing and wood-carving were options. We're at 17 groups in 2009.

P.H.T. (Putting Hubby Through). In 1949, the women of the university community created a new degree to recognize the

contributions of the married students' wives at a formal P.H.T. (Putting Hubby Through) graduation ceremony. The UWC assisted in the program to award diplomas to 165 women; hundreds more were awarded into the early 1960s.

Honors Tea. The Retirees' Tea, a traditional May function, was renamed the Honors Tea in 1991 to recognize University women who have brought honor to all women and to the University through their accomplishments. More than 30 women have received the Margaret Willard Award.

In 1972, the Faculty Women's Club changed its name to University Women's Club to reflect the broader membership. Friendship, hospitality, and service have evolved to reflect the role and interests of women in 2009 - education, friendship and service. Happy 90th Birthday UWC!

A Good Planet is Hard to Find

Kepler is a space-borne telescope and is NASA's first mission capable of detecting Earth-size planets around other stars in our Galaxy. Kepler is designed to search for Earth-size planets orbiting in the habitable zone of stars like our sun. The habitable zone is the region around a star where the temperature permits water to be liquid on the surface of a planet. Liquid water is considered essential for the existence of life. Kepler was launched on March 9, 2009 and is now actively monitoring over 100,000 stars in the Milky Way in search of another Earth. Mr. Troeltzsch will discuss the mission and Ball's role in building and launching the spacecraft. He will also discuss Kepler's current status and the key role the University of Colorado plays in controlling the satellite from the Laboratory for Atmospheric and Space Physics.

John Troeltzsch is the Kepler mission program manager for Ball Aerospace. Mr. Troeltzsch grew up in Boulder and studied at the University of Colorado receiving both bachelor's and master's degrees in Aerospace Engineering. He is a third generation engineer and was inspired by his father's ability to solve problems, think clearly, and do math. He has been with Ball Aerospace for 26 years working on the Hubble Space Telescope Program, the Spitzer Space Telescope launched in 2003, and now the Kepler Mission.

True Health Reform: How to Prevent Cardiac Death - the #1 Killer of American Women

A national debate ensues regarding health care reform. Dr. Trujillo believes that the focus of the debate should not be on *financing* health care, but on the *health of our citizens*. Six hundred thousand deaths a year are attributable to cardiovascular disease. Many of these deaths can be prevented with simple lifestyle measures. Dr. Trujillo's discussion will focus on nine ways to prevent a first heart attack without the use of medications.

Nelson P. Trujillo, Jr., MD is a partner in Rocky Mountain Cardiology. He received a Bachelor of Science and Engineering from Tulane University School of Engineering before attaining a Doctor of Medicine with Distinction from George Washington University School of Medicine. He completed his residency and several fellowships at the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center in Denver. In addition to Cardiovascular Medicine, Dr. Trujillo is also board certified in Internal Medicine, Nuclear Medicine, and Interventional Cardiology. He is a highly respected speaker who has made presentations all over Boulder County, the state of Colorado, and the nation. In 2008, he was honored with the Salud Clinic/Clinica Campesina Service Award.

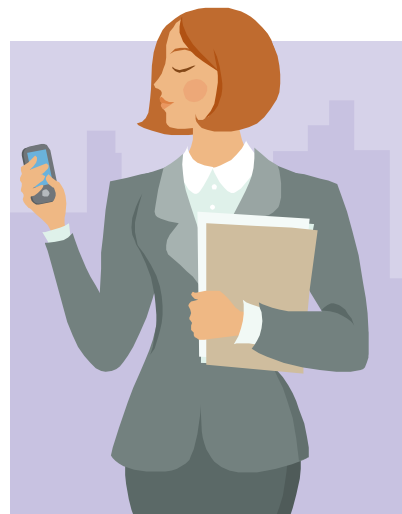
Another Opportunity to Help

What: This will consist of master classes, short recitals, demonstrations of technique - voice and instruments, & more all day Saturday at the Boulder Public Library, Main Branch.

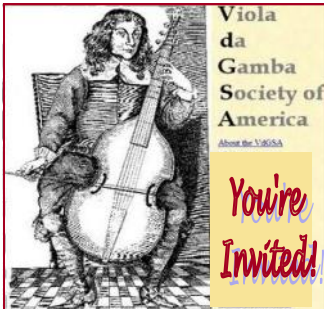

President's Message

90 Years - Florence Grieder... Reminiscing

As part of our UWC 90 Year celebration series, we meet Florence Peck Grieder this month. Florence moved to Boulder in 1940; her career as a teacher had ended after the birth of her first child in 1931. She joined the UWC that year and served as President from 1967-68. Active in the community, she served on the School Board for 12 years, the last six as President... "my unpaid career." She was the only woman member of the school board during those years. "In my day, most women were housewives," she recalls. "They supported their husbands and participated in social and community functions."

The following are enlightening excerpts from UWC's 75th Anniversary publication.

"When my husband and I came to the University in 1940, the enrollment was 4,200 and the population of Boulder a mere 13,000. The faculty was small enough that the president's wife, the lovely Amy Stearns, called on all the new families. I well remember when she called on me. She came beautifully dressed, with hat and gloves, and left her card. She

found me breathless and unkempt, as our frisky Irish setter had just taken me for a run. Our furniture, coming by train from Buffalo, had not yet arrived. The



plumber had shut off the water for repairs. None of this mattered. I soon felt welcomed and comfortable."

"Our dean's wife, Mrs. Harl Douglass, took me to my first meeting of the Women's Club. It was customary for the deans' wives to do this for new faculty wives and was a very welcome gesture to new arrivals. Meetings were held once a month on a Friday

afternoon at 2:45. The ladies came dressed for the occasion, always in hats and gloves, the accepted accessories for afternoon functions. The president, Mrs. Arthur Cross, conducted the business meeting, which was followed by a program with a speaker and some music. The committee appointed for this meeting then served tea at a beautifully decorated table with the Club's silver, flowers, and tea delicacies. It was an honor when one was asked to pour."

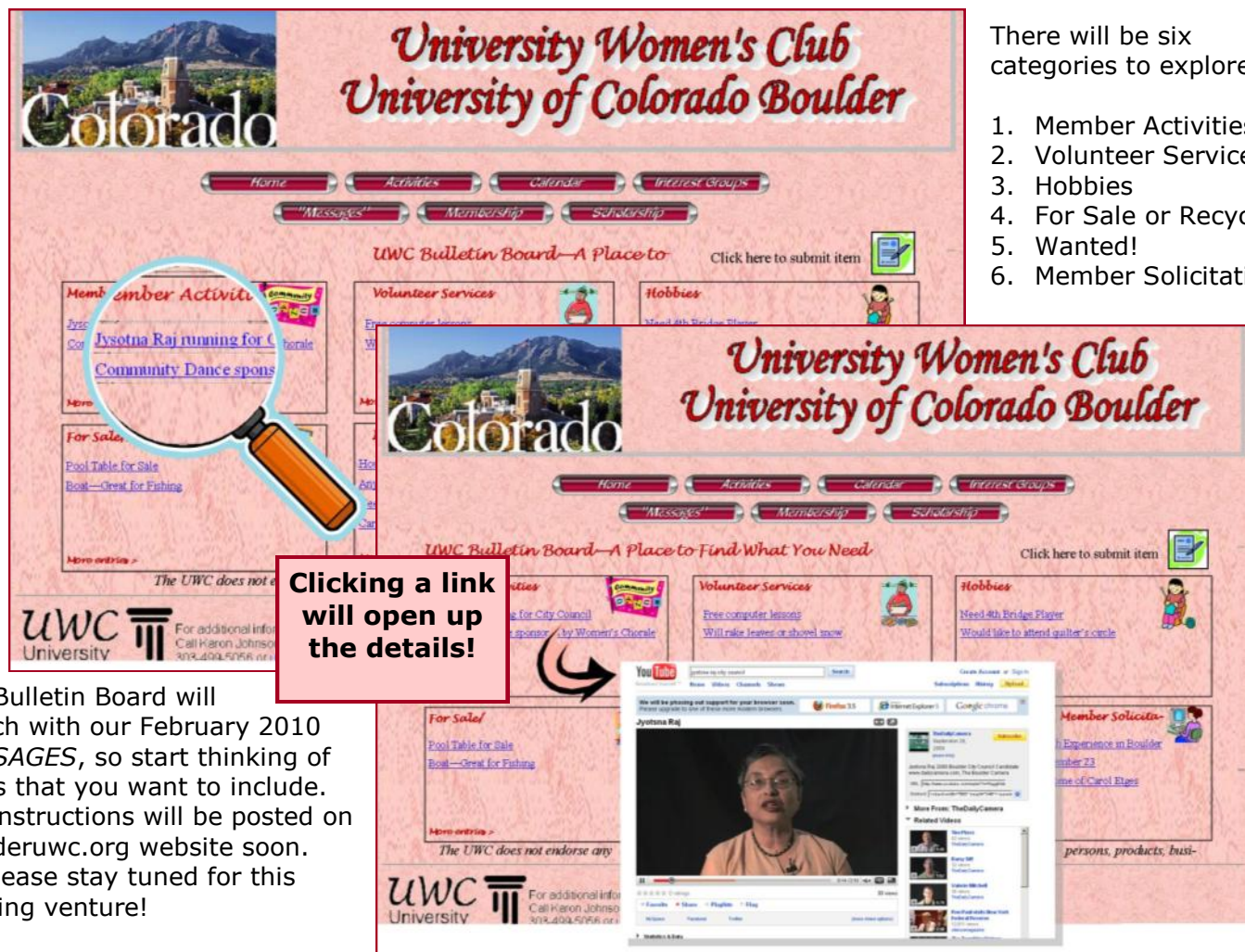

UWC 90 Years: The Years of Change

This is the last in the series recounting the UWC's 90-year history. We will be celebrating our 90th birthday on December 8 at the Lecture Luncheon. Please join us for the festivities!

1960's and 70's

The 60's and 70's found the campus in an uproar over the Viet Nam war. The Women's Movement was launched and women were becoming disenchanted with the idea of being a "club women." In 1973, the Faculty Women's Club changed its name to the University Women's Club as membership was expanded to include any woman employed by or connected with the university. There was some dissent and we lost members because there were those who preferred the exclusivity of a faculty wives community.

During this period, Interest and Service Groups flourished, as did the Lecture Luncheon series, but changing times were reflected in the Club as we gradually withdrew from coordinating University social functions. Hats were out, gloves cast aside, the silver and china sold, and Dean's wives no longer escorted new members to meetings.

1980's, 90's and Today

The turbulent 60's and 70's brought changes to the nation, the university, and to the club, including opportunity for women. In 1986, 16% of the faculty at CU were women; today it is 40%. In 1993, we saw the first woman President of the University of Colorado — Judith E. N. Albino.

The changing role of women was reflected in the Club. For many years, the formal name for married members was their husband's name: Mrs. George Norlin.

Refer to *UWC 2009-10 Membership Directory* and the Past Presidents list where you will note that in the 80's the convention changed. Now: Mamie Norlin. Go Mamie!

As time went on and women worked, members recognized that the value of their volunteer time was greater than the profit of most fund-raising efforts. So, in the 90's, the Club decided to forego intensive fund-raising efforts and instead look to the membership for funds to support philanthropic efforts (scholarships) and other activities.

And, the Club began to recognize and celebrate women's contributions! The President's Award and the Margaret Willard Award are now awarded annually to outstanding women.

While there have been many changes in these 90 years, much is the same for the UWC — lectures, social gatherings, interest groups, and volunteer activities continue. The UWC reflects the historical and cultural changes that our nation has undergone, and continues to reflect its initial mission — **a community of women who foster friendship, intellectual pursuits, and service.**

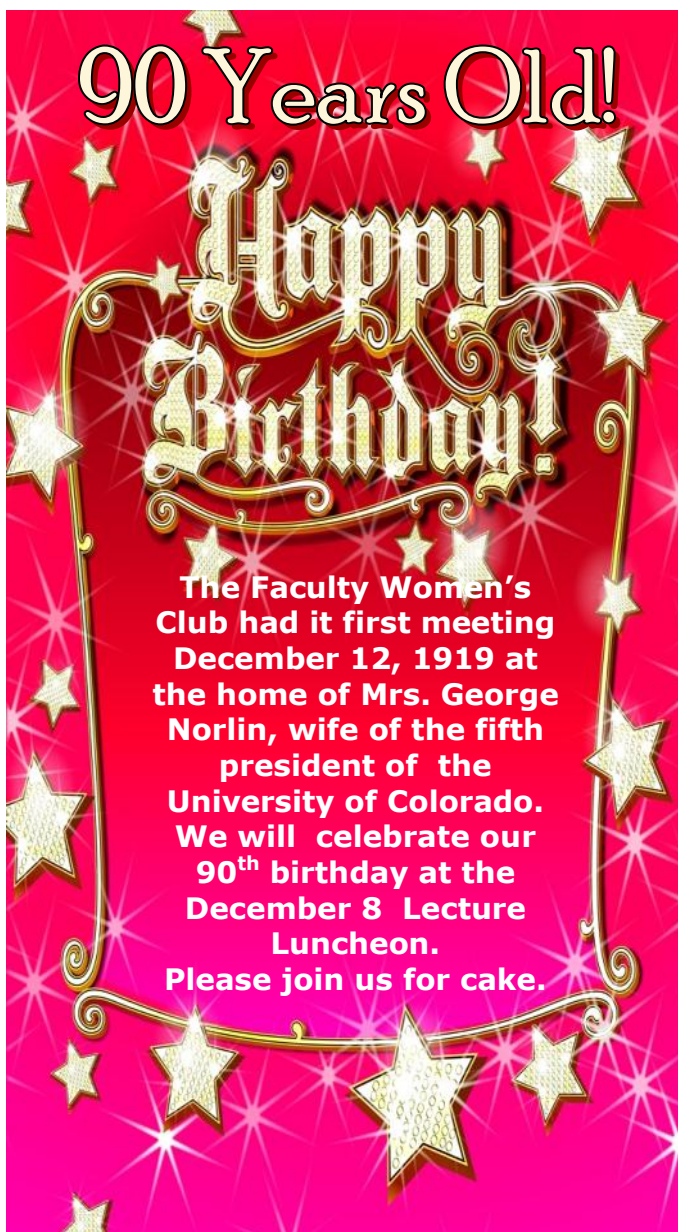

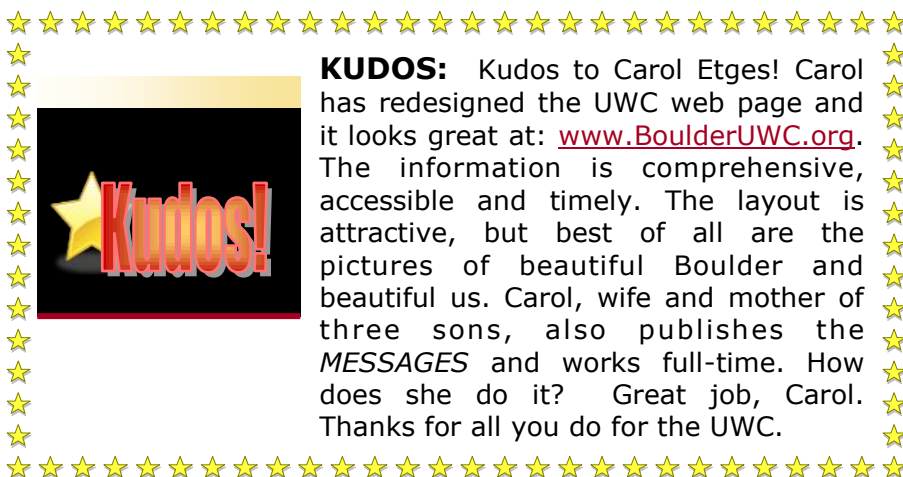

How many of you watch, or have ever watched, *The Oprah Winfrey Show*? 46 million in the U.S. and viewers from 134 countries join in every week. founder and head of Harpo, Inc., the first multimedia corporation (tv, film, radio, print, and online) owned by an African American. Her net worth in 2007 was \$1.5 billion.

She has been credited with resuscitating the publishing industry with the Oprah Book Club, and *O, The Oprah Magazine* sells 2.5 million copies a month. Her web site averages 64 million page views and more than 3 million unique visitors a month and the TV show receives 12,000-15,000 emails each week.

Who are these people?

Peck combines a political analysis of Winfrey's media empire and public persona with a historic analysis of the political, economic, and ideological practices of neoliberalism that have produced and sustained the *Age of Oprah*.

Drawing on her recent book, *The Age of Oprah: Cultural Icon for the Neoliberal Era* (2008), Janice Peck will discuss Oprah Winfrey's rise from mere talk show host to cultural icon of mainstream America. She will explain how tracing the history of Winfrey's enterprise, and situating it in relation to major currents in American political, economic, and cultural history provides a means to critically examine the intersection of American politics and culture—and the contradictions therein—over the past quarter century.

Janice Peck is an Associate Professor in the School of Journalism and Mass Communication at CU-Boulder, where she teaches media studies. She is the author of two books, *The Gods of Televangelism: The Crisis of Meaning and the Appeal of Religious Television* (1993) and *The Age of Oprah: Cultural Icon for the Neoliberal Era* (2008), and has published work in many other media topics. 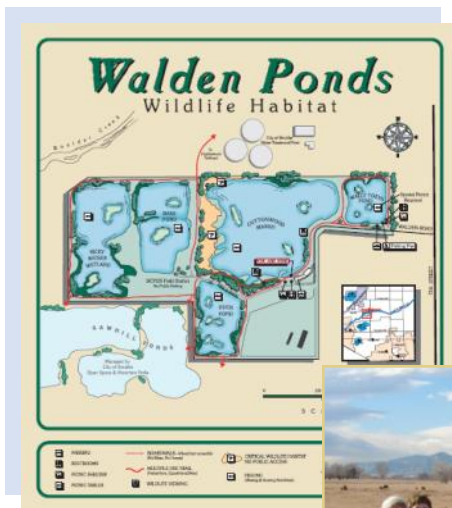

The UWC Scholarship Luncheon is April 13 and we look forward to meeting this year's scholars. We recently learned that it will cost a CU resident (undergrad) \$20,000 for tuition, fees, room/board and books for the 2010-11 academic year. Let's take a look at CU, its students, and what \$20,000 will buy.

CU-Boulder – 133 Year History of Educating Students from Colorado.

CU is a Tier 1 research institution that received more than \$289 million in sponsored research awards for 2008, placing it 13th nationally and 6th among all public universities. It is one of only 34 U.S. public research universities in the prestigious Association of American Universities, and U.S. News & World Report ranked it 34th among the nation's top 50 public universities offering doctoral programs in its 2010 America's Best Colleges issue.

CU employees—1,075 tenure/tenure track faculty members, 40% of whom are women and 13% minority. It offers 3,400 courses in 150 fields of study; 80 majors at the bachelor's level, 70 at the master's and 52 at the doctoral level.

CU-Boulder is one of Colorado's primary economic engines. One of the largest employers in Boulder County, it provided 6,730 jobs in 2009 and directly impacted the state's professional workforce, new business development, and overall financial outlook. In the past five years, 27 new companies – from biotechnology to renewable energy – have been formed based on CU technologies.

CU Students – Some Statistics.

During the 2008-09 academic year, 6,526 degrees were granted and more than 30,000 students were enrolled:

The U. S. Census Bureau reports that workers over the age of 18 with a high school degree earn an average of \$27,915 annually, a bachelor's degree \$51,206, and those with an advanced degree \$74,602. **Education provides a big payoff!**

A Best Buy.

CU is one of only 14 U.S. public institutions recognized as a "Best Buy" in the 2009 edition of the Fiske Guide to Colleges. CU has earned a global reputation for high-quality teaching, research, service, and providing Colorado students with an excellent education at a bargain price. Hard to believe that \$20,000 is a bargain price!
