



Do you love UWC events but hate the hassle of parking? Try taking the bus! It is easy and convenient once you know how, so here's the drill.

General Info about Riding the Bus

Bus stops are marked with a red sign that says "The Ride". You don't need to flag the bus down, just stand there looking like you are waiting for a bus.

It costs \$2.25 for each trip if you are under age 65; \$1.10 if you are 65 or older. You must have the correct fare as the bus driver cannot give you any change. You put your money into the fare collection box by the driver. If your trip is going to take more than one bus, you ask the driver for a transfer. When you get on the second bus, show the driver your transfer.

As you approach the stop where you want to get off, pull the cord above you or press the strip on a vertical support. This will produce a red sign at the front of the bus which says "Stop Requested".

What Bus Route to Take

If you are within walking distance of a bus route, you can go directly from home but don't give up if you're too far away. You can park your car in a free parking lot, and take the bus from there.

From anywhere in North Boulder near Broadway:

Park at Broadway and Quince in the lot by Lucky's Market. Walk out to Broadway, cross the street and look for the bus shelter with The Ride sign. Wait for the southbound **Skip** bus. In the middle of the day, the bus runs every 10 minutes. The bus will take you south on Broadway to the corner of Euclid, right across Broadway from the University Memorial Center. Pull the cord after you have passed the stop near College Avenue. On the way home, pull the cord after you pass Poplar Avenue.

From anywhere in South Boulder near Broadway:

Park at Table Mesa Shopping Center. Cross Broadway and look for the bus shelter and The Ride sign. Wait for the northbound **Skip** bus or **Dash** bus. In the middle of the day, the Skip runs every 10 minutes. The bus will take you north on Broadway to the corner of Euclid, right across Euclid from the University Memorial Center. Pull the cord after you have passed 17th Street.

From anywhere convenient to 29th Street Mall:

Park in the parking garage. Go to street level at the north end of the mall near Macy's. You will catch the **Hop** bus. There is a Hop that goes clockwise around the route and one that goes counterclockwise. To get to the University Memorial Center you will want to take the **clockwise Hop** because it will be quite a bit quicker. For the clockwise route go to the bus stop on the west side of the street very near the store called *Black and White*. During the middle of the day the bus runs every 7-10 minutes. It will take you along Canyon, Folsom and Colorado to Euclid and will let you off right in front of the University Memorial Center. Pull the cord after you turn the corner onto Euclid. To go back to the mall, catch the counterclockwise **Hop** on 16th Street (Euclid) on the west side of Broadway.

From your own home:

Use the Trip Planner at the RTD website <u>http://www.rtd-denver.com/</u>. Type in your address and the address you want to get to (Broadway and Euclid if you are going to the University Memorial Center) and fill in the rest of the required information. RTD will figure out the best bus route for you.



Spotlight on ... Bridge



Formed in September 2009, the Bridge Interest Group began as two groups and added another last year. Each group meets once a month to play Rubber Contract Bridge, the kind encountered in informal settings. Each group has regular members who play almost every month and substitute members who are asked to play when a regular member cannot. For play, tallies are used to determine partners for 3 or 4 rounds, and contract bridge or Chicago bridge scoring is used to determine the winner, who receives a small prize.

All our members, regular and substitute, have experience playing bridge. We have a wonderful blend of players who enjoy playing with other members who may play at another level of experience, and we

are always trying to learn from playing. Some members are advanced players who have played bridge for many years. Other members, who played in the past, have found a group to play with again.

In addition to our three bridge groups, when there is interest, we have formed study groups. Our study groups address the level of study desired by the members, intermediate to advanced. Study group members decide when and how often to meet.

At the September Membership Coffee, we hope to learn if there is interest in forming another bridge group and in forming study groups.

Third Thursday group meets monthly at 10:30 a.m. to approximately 2:00 p.m. at the Eggcredible Café. There are 12 regular members for 3 tables and substitute members.

As an example, women suffering from heart attacks might have different and sometimes milder symptoms than men. One of the preeminent researchers on the Boulder campus, sponsored by the Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI), Leslie will entertainingly describe her fascinating findings. If we're lucky, we may hear a bit about her work with pythons in relation to human cardiac therapeutics.

Dr. Leinwand is a Professor of Molecular, Cellular, and Developmental Biology and Chief Scientific Officer of the Colorado Initiative in Molecular Biotechnology at the University of Colorado, Boulder. She received her Bachelor's degree from Cornell University, her Ph.D. from Yale University and did post-doctoral training at Rockefeller University. She joined the faculty at Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York and remained there until moving to Colorado.

While at Albert Einstein, she became a Full Professor and was Director of the Cardiovascular Research Center. Once moved to Colorado, along with Michael Bristow, Eric Olson, and she co-founded Myogen, Inc. which was recently sold to Gilead Pharmaceuticals. The interests of Dr. Leinwand's laboratory are the genetics and molecular physiology of inherited diseases of the heart and how gender and diet modify the heart. The study of these diseases and physiological processes has required multidisciplinary approaches, involving molecular biology, mouse genetics, mouse cardiac physiology, and the analysis of human tissues. To accomplish this, Dr. Leinwand has developed a highly collaborative group, bringing together specialized basic scientists and clinical cardiologists.

Her laboratory's efforts are well funded and her teaching is recognized by funding from the Howard Hughes Medical Institute's Professor Program. She is also the Program Director of the HHMI program, the Biological Sciences Initiative, which supports undergraduate research, K-12 outreach and educational programs for high school teachers.

As an example, women suffering from heart attacks might have different and sometimes milder symptoms than men. One of the preeminent researchers on the Boulder campus, sponsored by the Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI), Leslie will entertainingly describe her fascinating findings. If we're lucky, we may hear a bit about her work with pythons in relation to human cardiac therapeutics.

Dr. Leinwand is a Professor of Molecular, Cellular, and Developmental Biology and Chief Scientific Officer of the Colorado Initiative in Molecular Biotechnology at the University of Colorado, Boulder. She received her Bachelor's degree from Cornell University, her Ph.D. from Yale University and did post-doctoral training at Rockefeller University. She joined the faculty at Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York and remained there until moving to Colorado. While at Albert Einstein, she became a full professor and was Director of the Cardiovascular Research Center. Once moved to Colorado, along with Michael Bristow and Eric Olson she co-founded Myogen, Inc. which was recently sold to Gilead Pharmaceuticals. The interests of Dr. Leinwand's laboratory are the genetics and molecular physiology of inherited diseases of the heart and how gender and diet modify the heart. The study of these diseases and physiological processes has required multidisciplinary approaches, involving molecular biology, mouse genetics, mouse cardiac physiology, and the analysis of human tissues. To accomplish this, Dr. Leinwand has developed a highly collaborative group, bringing together specialized basic scientists and clinical cardiologists.

Her laboratory's efforts are well funded and her teaching is recognized by funding from the Howard Hughes Medical Institute's Professor Program. She is also the Program Director of the HHMI program, the Biological Sciences Initiative, which supports undergraduate research, K-12 outreach and educational programs for high school teachers.



December Lecture Luncheon I slam as a Media Spectacle Nabil Echchaibi Tuesday, December 13, 2011, 11:30 a.m. University Memorial Center, Room 235 (Reservations and payment due December 6)

Have the media compounded a minor conflict with the debate around the building of a Muslim community center in lower Manhattan, or have they simply chronicled a rampant fear of Islam and Muslims in American society? How can we have a sensible and constructive conversation about the place of Muslims in America? Nabil is a scholar doing important and very interesting work.

Nabil Echchaibi is an assistant professor of journalism and media studies and associate director of the Center for Media, Religion and Culture at the University of Colorado-Boulder. His research is situated at the crossroad of important contemporary issues such as identity, religion, and the role of media in shaping and reflecting modern religious subjectivities among Muslims in the Middle East and in diaspora. His work on diasporic media and the leveling of religious authority through the proliferation of Islamic media has appeared in various international publications such as Javnost, International Communication Gazette, Journal of Intercultural Studies, Nations and Nationalism, Journal of Arab and Muslim Media Research, and Media Development. Dr. Echchaibi is currently working on his book, Formations of the Muslim Modern: Islam, Media and Alternative Modernity, which explores how Muslims engage, through their own media production, modernity as a source of both contention and identification. Using a multilayered analysis of six case studies of Muslim media in Cairo, Los Angeles, Dubai, San Francisco, London, and Austin, the book examines how transnational satellite television and digital media have become prime discursive and performative stages where young individuals and institutions debate and contest what it means to be "modern" in the Muslim context.

Dr. Echchaibi is also directing a project funded by the Social Science Research Council, which will compile a cultural history of Muslims in the Mountain West region of the United States. The project will produce an interactive web resource and a documentary film. His book Voicing Diasporas: Ethnic Radio in Paris and Berlin Between Culture and Renewal is forthcoming with Lexington Books in 2011. His coedited book International Blogging: Identity, Politics and Networked Publics was published in 2009 by Peter Lang Publishing. Prior to joining CU, Dr. Echchaibi taught at Franklin College in Lugano, Switzerland, where he helped set up the international communication department, the University of Louisville and Indiana University-Bloomington. A native of Morocco, he earned his BA from Mohammed V University in Rabat and his MA and PhD from Indiana University-Bloomington.

Since 1919, when the University Women's Club was formally organized, friendship, hospitality and service have been identified as common themes and continue to serve us well as guiding principles in all that we do. We have a tradition of

philanthropic work while maintaining our mission to foster friendship among members, individual expression through interest groups, and intellectual stimulation through the sharing and gaining of knowledge via the Lecture Luncheon series.

The results have told us clearly that service is a value you embrace. The majority of respondents reported that they were involved in volunteer/service work outside of the UWC. The majority also reported that UWC is an important source for identifying volunteer opportunities. They also do not see the need to be involved in UWC group volunteer activities and projects. These findings are interesting and along with written comments will be used as a guideline for redesigning our current interpretation of service as set forth in the Constitution.

In closing, I would like you to consider the concept of service as it is manifested within the University Women's Club. I am humbled by the energy and enthusiasm of our members who say "yes" to requests for any level of participation. Your Board, Interest Group Chairs, and guest lecturers work long, sometimes hard, and always unpaid hours. Many donate their expenses to the scholarship fund. How the Broadway Construction Project Impacts Parking

How the <u>Broadway and Euclid Transportation Improvement Project</u> impacts attendees' access to the UMC vicinity via transit depends on where they are coming from and which bus route they are arriving on. From a transit perspective, there are 15 different bus routes that operate in that vicinity and that will be impacted by the project.

ACCESS VIA BROADWAY TRANSIT ROUTES

Now through December 18: For the people arriving via one of the 10 routes operating on Broadway (AB, BV/BF/BX, DD, DM, GS, DASH, SKIP, 203, 204, 225) and travelling toward downtown Boulder (north and east on Broadway) there are two options to <u>the now closed bus</u> <u>stop</u> on Broadway between the UMC and Euclid Avenue:

- ⇒ The bus stop on Broadway, just north of Regent, near the University Administrative Center at 914 Broadway.
- ⇒ The bus stop on Broadway, just before the College Avenue underpass, near the Museum Collections Building.

Beginning between December 19 – 25, the <u>bus stop</u> across Broadway from the UMC, next to the Uni-Hill Elementary School (serving buses south bound on Broadway) will also be closed. Once this stop is closed, the two nearest options are the corresponding, south-bound bus stops across the street from those listed above (a) & b)):

- ⇒ The <u>bus stop</u> on south-bound Broadway, just north of 20th Street and across Broadway from the <u>University Administrative Center</u> at 914 Broadway.
- ⇒ The <u>bus stop</u> on south-bound Broadway, just north of College Avenue, next to the College underpass and across Broadway from the <u>Economics Building</u>.

ACCESS VIA TRANSIT ROUTES TRAVERSING CAMPUS

Five transit routes traverse campus (HOP, Buff Bus, 209, J and STAMPEDE). The north-bound Buff Bus, J and STAMPEDE routes formerly stopped at <u>the now closed bus stop</u> on Broadway between the UMC and Euclid Avenue. The nearest two options for north-bound riders on these three routes now are:

- \Rightarrow The <u>bus stop</u> on north-bound 18th Street next to the <u>IMIG Music Building</u> at 1020 18th Street.
- ⇒ The <u>bus stop</u> on south-bound Broadway, just north of 20th Street and across Broadway from the <u>University Administrative Center</u> at 914 Broadway.

Margaret C. Campbell is an associate professor of marketing at the Leeds School of Business, University of Colorado Boulder. Professor Campbell received her A.B. in psychology and economics with honors and distinction, at Stanford University, where she earned entrance to Phi Beta Kappa. She later returned to Stanford to earn her Ph.D. in marketing at the Graduate School of Business. She was a member of the faculty at the Anderson Graduate School of Management at UCLA from 1992-2000.

Professor Campbell's research focuses on questions of how consumers interpret the marketplace and how their interpretations influence their responses to companies and brands. Her research has been published in several journals including the *Journal of Consumer Research*, the *Journal of Marketing Research*, and the *Personality and Social Psychology Bulletin*. She currently serves on the editorial review boards of the *Journal of Consumer Research*, *Journal of Retailing*, *Journal of the Academy of Marketing Science*, and the *International Journal of Research in Marketing*. She has been appointed Associate Editor at the *Journal of Consumer Research* beginning in June 2011.

Professor Campbell teaches in the undergraduate, MBA, and PhD programs. She has taught classes on advertising and promotion, integrated marketing communications, brand management, consumer behavior/psychology, and principles of marketing.

Broadway Construction Project Continues

During the university winter break, construction continued on the Broadway (Euclid-18th) Transportation Improvement Project.

Campus pedestrian and traffic impacts for winter break included: The existing Euclid Avenue closed to vehicular traffic and the newly re-routed Euclid Avenue is open for right turns in and out of campus for busses only. The detour for vehicular traffic entering and exiting campus via Broadway Street will be 18th Street.

The HOP and Stampede bus routes will continue serving stops on Broadway Street and on 18th Street at the Imig Music Building. The HOP bus stop on westbound Euclid at the UMC has been removed; this stop has been temporarily relocated to westbound 18th Street at Broadway Street. The southbound RTD bus stop located at University Hill Elementary School has been relocated further south on Broadway Street. Riders accessing this stop can cross at pedestrian lights located at Broadway and 17th Street or 18th Street. The northbound Broadway RTD bus stops at Regent Drive and College Avenue will be operational. The Broadway multi-use pedestrian and bicycle path has been detoured near Euclid Avenue to avoid the construction site.

Broadway Street has been reduced to two lanes; one lane in each direction. This traffic configuration will continue for approximately 5 months. Please note all dates are weather dependent and subject to change.

The Rocky Mountains may be celebrating Black History Month

famous for gold and silver, but the Gold Rush of 1859 brought more than material treasures to Colorado. In 1859, "Aunt" Clara Brown, a newlyfreed slave from Kentucky, made the long journey westward to start a new life in Colorado. Reportedly the first black woman to arrive in Colorado during the Gold Rush, Aunt Clara helped pave the way for generations of outstanding Coloradoan women.

On a gold-rush frontier where everyone dreamed of striking it rich, Clara Brown gave a fortune away. A humble laundress when she got to Central City in 1859, she amassed her wealth the old-fashioned way,

through hard work and shrewd investments. But she used most of her money to help others: out-of-luck miners, religious organizations, schools, and former slaves getting their first taste of freedom after the Civil War. The latter cause had special meaning for Clara Brown for she herself had been a slave. She spent the first fifty-plus years of her life in bondage on Kentucky plantations, purchasing her freedom for \$120 in 1856. But in the 29 years that remained to her, this remarkable woman made the most of her liberty, building a new life for herself and helping countless other Colorado pioneers do the same. 

David passionately tells the stories and highlights the work of an elite group of Soviet-Jewish photographers—never-before-published photographs from families, collectors, and private archives. These artists participated in a social project they believed in and with which they were emotionally and intellectually invested—they

were charged by the Stalinist state to tell the visual story of the unprecedented horror we now call the Holocaust. *His latest book will be available for purchase.*

Bio:

David Shneer is professor of history and director of the Program in Jewish Studies at the University of Colorado at Boulder. Called a "taboo-breaking scholar" by Tikkun magazine, Shneer's work concentrates on modern Jewish society and culture. His books include *Queer Jews*, finalist for the Lambda Literary award, *Yiddish and the Creation of Soviet Jewish Culture*,

finalist for the National Jewish Book Award, and *New Jews: The End of the Jewish Diaspora*, that has sparked discussion in publications like the Economist and the Jerusalem Post. His newest book, *Through Soviet Jewish Eyes: Photography, War, & the Holocaust*, looks at the lives and works of two dozen World War II military photographers to examine what kinds of photographs they took when they encountered evidence of Nazi genocide on the Eastern Front.

He has lived and worked as a scholar and writer in Russia, Germany, and Israel and has written for the New York Times, Huffington Post, Rocky Mountain News and the Denver Post as well as magazines dedicated to Jewish life and culture, including Forward, Pakntreger, Jewcy, and Nextbook. Shneer has taught or been a scholar-in-residence at the University of California campuses at Berkeley and Davis, and at the University of Illinois, the National Yiddish Book Center, the University of Wisconsin, the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, serving as the Pearl Resnick Fellow, and the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley. He serves as consultant to numerous Jewish agencies on questions of contemporary Jewish identity, and serves on the board of directors of the Association for Jewish Studies. He has won prestigious fellowships from the Social Science Research Council, the International Research and Exchange Council, and the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum.

For over 90 years, UWC women have given freely of the themselves to a

variety of causes. I have thoroughly enjoyed reading our history of "sharing and caring." The written materials have described selfless acts for the good of our country, the university, and the community. Our service heritage can make us all proud of who were, who we are, and who we will become.

The results of the Service Survey, completed by over one third of our members, have given the Board a clear picture of how service manifests itself at the UWC. The summary here is intended to give you an overview of the results. If you would like more detail, please contact me.

1) 55% of respondents do not see the UWC as a referral source to help them find volunteer projects.

2) 44% indicate that they do not rely on UWC as a volunteer referral source.3) 38% do not consider it important to volunteer with other UWC

members on group projects.

4) 58% of respondents are involved with volunteer activities outside of UWC.

It appears that our members are committed to service activities and find that there are opportunities outside of the UWC. At the same time, more than half of this sample want to be involved in UWC groups on service projects and use the club as a referral source for service opportunities.

The Board has asked Linda Blomquist to act as our referral resource. She will be responsible for keeping a catalogue of Boulder and community service groups and their activities. Please contact her to both give and receive information. In addition, the Board is looking for an individual with a passion for service who would be willing to serve as Service Chair. This is a Board position. This person could create or find group activities/events or opportunities for individuals,

such as tutoring or reading to the blind. Please contact me directly if you are interested.

Finally, I would encourage any member who is involved in a service group to encourage participation by other UWC members by highlighting your group and upcoming events in *MESSAGES*. We will reserve space in the remaining issues for this purpose.



This "dream come true" was a reality for UWC member, Sherry Bruff.


"I had to read it over again three or four times," laughs Sherry. "I was elated, excited, surprised and disbelieving."

We currently have fourteen members and meet two to three times a month to practice our Spanish conversation for about an hour on Monday afternoons at 3:30 p.m. We have been fortunate to have UWC member, Gloria Garcia de Miller, as our mentor. Gloria is originally from Venezuela and provides us invaluable assistance as the only native speaker. Gloria has experience volunteering this type of assistance in the past to

The Spanish Speakers Conversation Group seemed to be having so much fun that a group of us decided to start a Beginning Spanish Group two years ago. We found a wonderful teacher in Rosalie Olson, with whom we've been taking lessons for two years. Rosalie had a son, Magnus, six months ago, and we enjoyed his company at our lessons, but she decided to retire to spend more time with him at the end of January. We were lucky to find Scott Spanbauer, our new teacher, who is a Spanish professor at CU. Scott has lived in various Central and South American countries and promises to be a lively and interesting teacher.

Because we're starting with a new instructor, we've opted to take the time to review our lessons through conversations, practicing vocabulary, sentence structure, verb forms. None of us do quite enough homework, but we laugh and have fun, occasionally go to lunch at a Mexican restaurant to practice, and are often quite surprised at how much Spanish we really do know. Our goal is to be able to be understood by Spanish speakers and to understand them when we travel.



Our classes are held in the Conference Room at The Bramford at 500 Mohawk each Tuesday 10-11 a.m. Lessons are \$12 each when you attend. Our group averages seven or eight women per class, though there are 12 of us signed up. If you might be interested in joining us, please contact Sherry (sherry.bruff@colorado.edu).

ALLY Youth Services

Why are young people living on the streets? Some are escaping abusive parents or stepparents. Others are thrown out for being gay. Parents addicted to methamphetamines, unable to provide support for their children, are behind other homeless kids. Sometimes kids think it will be an adventure. Well, it is, but not the kind one would want to have.

They are immediately thrown into survival mode, seeking food and a place to stay out of the cold or rain. Within 48 hours many have turned to prostitution to survive. Others crash with friends, a short-term solution. Increasingly hungry, dirty, and lonely, they lose the energy to think of the future.

Here's where ALLY Youth Services, or ALLY, can help. Staffed by former volunteers with StandUp for Kids, ALLY works with youth 24 and under. Four evenings a week, we provide meals, clothing, showers, and a sense of family to these young people. Beyond that, we seek to help them lead purposeful lives, off the streets. We link them to services: medical, educational, legal or others depending on their needs. Youth advocates help with goals, visit them in jails, aid with jobs, housing, and education, and provide a reliable friend.

Two of our clients have earned their GED's while in jail. When we visited one young man and said we'd been worried about him, he said, "Of course. That's what family does." We are his only family.

A young woman from Russia lived in her car, worked at Subway and volunteered in a dentist's office while putting herself through dental hygiene school. She now works for a dentist in Denver. We gave her meals, clothes, and a sense of community. One young man helps with the BOHO (Boulder Outreach for Homeless Overflow) warming centers, and another works in a bike shop. Several have gotten their IDs for job applications, schools, and housing, and are applying for jobs. A few reconciled with family.

Our new quarters are smaller but cozier in the First Baptist Church on Pine. Having lost our former food providers, we are in need of people willing to bring in dinner for about ten, one night a week or a month. We're allowed to use the church kitchen, so if you feel like volunteering to come in and cook, perhaps teaching one or two young people to cook at the same time, you'd be welcome. If you have a different skill you'd like to share, you'd be welcome.

UWC member Jill Grubb, a volunteer with StandUp for five years, has moved to ALLY, a totally local new organization. The Colorado Non-Profit Development Center is helping to review grants and watch our money, and the Director of Housing and Human Services is supportive. A volunteer's father donated our first six months of rent, and Boulder Friends Meeting will provide some funds, but otherwise we are seeking financial assistance and/or donations of food, backpacks, tents, and sleeping bags. Making History Come Alive!

If you are interested in history, Boulder County Parks and Open Space has volunteer opportunities for you. These two opportunities can bring history to life for you.

Volunteers at the Walker Ranch

Homestead dress in clothing styles of the late 1800s and demonstrate daily chores of a working western ranch including cooking on a wood-burning stove, churning butter, making roof shingles, practicing roping skills, and doing laundry the old fashioned way with a scrub board, wringer & tub.

For those whose schedules allow, there are also opportunities to help with special presentations for school groups that visit the ranch on field trips.



Training is required to volunteer at Walker Ranch and is scheduled for Thursday, May 3 from 6-9 p.m. and Saturday,

May 5th from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Training will include topics on local history, lifestyles of the 1880s, historical ranch activities, and interpretive techniques. Later trainings will be offered.

So, grab a friend and sign up for this great volunteer opportunity! Application deadline is April 25. (Children must be at least 9 years old to participate.)

A second volunteer opportunity is at **Longmont's Agricultural Heritage Center** where volunteers teach visitors about agricultural life on the Front Range between 1900 and 1925.

Tours at the farm include two historic barns, multiple granaries, a silo, garage, a working blacksmith shop, interactive exhibits and a 1909 farmhouse decorated with furnishings from the period. Farm animals are also a part of the interpretive Training for both includes topics on local history, lifestyles of the 1880s, historical ranch
