

John is a local author of historical fiction. His stories are set in exotic locations such as Vietnam, Cambodia, Hindustan, and the South Pacific.


He is the bestselling author of, Beneath a Marble Sky, Cross Currents, Dragon House, and Beside a Burning Sea. His newest book,

Boulder County Seeks Volunteers to join the Citizen Ranger Corps



Do you enjoy spending time outdoors on the trails? If so, consider volunteering with the Citizen Ranger Corps for Boulder County Parks and Open Space.

Volunteers are welcome to hike, bike, or ride a horse while exploring some of Boulder County's most scenic open spaces while providing park visitors with information about cultural and natural history, recreational opportunities, facilities, and regulations. Volunteers will also be trained to lead and assist staff with work projects, visitor studies, community outreach and education, and wellness hikes.

In preparation for your duties, volunteers attend at least six out of eight monthly academy trainings. Trainings include wildlife forensics, winter survival training, visitor studies research, principles of education and outreach, emergency large animal evacuation center training, and more.

If you would like to be a part of an important volunteer corps that is making a difference in Boulder County this program is for you. Whether you want to help by enhancing the visitor experience in our beautiful parks or are considering a career in natural resources, please consider applying today.

This year's monthly trainings take place the first Saturday of every month from October to May. In addition, volunteers are required to patrol at least 24 hours in a calendar year and participate in four special assignments. The application deadline is Saturday, September 15.

It was a fine opportunity to connect with friends, join <u>Interest Groups</u>, renew your Membership, and sign up for our wonderful <u>Lecture Luncheon series</u>. Mary Anna Dunn and Mary Huffman, along with AD Chesley (and others), have been hard at work planning, and putting in place, these fine events.


• The board is working on an initiative to see if we can better streamline the functioning of <u>board operations and communications</u>. Diana King, one of our computer gurus, is spear-heading this initiative for us. You will likely hear more about this concept in the future.

• One of our board members has suggested that, when we email one another or put out 'mass' emails, we <u>begin the Subject Line with "UWC. . .</u>" That way, folks won't delete the email if they are unfamiliar with the name of the sender, which has sometimes been the case. Have you wanted to meet or write to your elected official about critical legislative matters to CU? Have you thought

about inviting a CU faculty expert to speak at a community forum on important topics? Have you thought about hosting a gathering in your community on the importance of higher education? CU Advocates, a University of Colorado program launched in the fall of 2011, educates and engages a network of individuals who care about the University of Colorado and want to get involved to promote CU's contributions around the state with elected officials, the media, and business and civic communities in Colorado.

The foundation of the program, an initiative of the Office of the President, is a network of educated, engaged and active volunteers who value the CU campuses and are willing to promote their educational, research and economic contributions. They stay informed on advocacy activities and issues and help ensure that CU's voice is heard in our communities and throughout Colorado, in the state Capitol, and in Washington, D.C.--often through social media channels and special events. The program is aligned with CU's operations in alumni relations, fundraising, government relations, admissions and campus outreach to find and develop opportunities to connect more people with the campuses.

Advocacy tools and information are housed on the website for advocates to use in communicating CU's contributions, opportunities and challenges. Sharing your story of CU's importance to Colorado can help put a face on the university and will provide compelling evidence for state investment in higher education.

The program draws on university supporters from many communities, including CU students, alumni, parents, faculty, staff, donors, and business and community leaders. They are asked to promote the university but also will have the opportunity to become more engaged with CU through volunteering, recommending students, hosting events, mentoring, speaking engagements, contacting elected officials and touring the campuses.

CU Advocates also receive invitations to special advocacy-only events as well as complimentary tickets to campus activities including sporting events. New members receive a welcome packet including an advocacy guide, CU pin, luggage tags and coupons for discounts on CU apparel.

"CU Advocates will be encouraged to share their CU story with their community and on the <u>program's website</u>, said Michele McKinney. "Perhaps a professor enlightened a student to discover a career path, or grandsons and granddaughters enrolled at a CU campus are becoming happy and successful young adults. Maybe a CU physician saved a loved one's life. These are the stories that define CU. By sharing these stories, we bring to life the value of our campuses."

The University Women's Club Scholarship

The University Women's Club established a scholarship fund in 1982 to help older students complete their degrees. Recipients must be at least 24 years of age and still working on their baccalaureate degree. Because they are older, they often face the difficult task of combining study with family and job responsibilities, and the UWC scholarship often can help them reduce their work responsibilities and concentrate on their education. The awards range from \$1,000 to \$4,000. Funds come from individual donations and an endowment established to help support the scholarships. As of 2012, \$139,000 has been awarded to 97 students.

Recipients are chosen based on their financial need, their GPA, their service, their initiative, and their leadership. Scholarship Committee members read all the applications carefully and compare and discuss their ratings before deciding. Scholarship winners are honored guests at the University Women's Club Annual Spring Luncheon which this year is April 16, 2013.

The 2011-12 Scholarship Committee consisted of Charlotte Corbridge, Jill Grubb, Pat Hagerty, Frieda Holley, Regina Macy, and Meg Preo. Frieda Holley served as chair. Most members will be continuing through 2012-13, but if you are interested in serving on the committee, especially in being chair, please contact Frieda Holley.

Margaret Willard Award

Margaret Willard began her career at CU as an English Instructor, wife of an history professor, and became the first president of the Faculty Wives' Club which has evolved into a more encompassing group, our University Women's Club. Though the original group liked to chat and sip tea, they grew in involvement in philanthropic matters. According to Sylvia Pettem, a Boulder local historian, these included providing eyeglasses and books to needy students, milk funds for schools, implementing student loans, and more.

The social aspects of their lives turned more and more to helping others as the world progressed through the Great Depression and World War 2. By 1957, they added fund raising and expanded the philanthropic work by providing financial scholarships for women, non-traditional females, who would not otherwise have been able to continue their education. We continue this tradition and recently have included men for scholarship consideration. Now UWC has grown to include interest and service groups and accept all women whether they have a CU association or not.

Since 1993, in May, at the Honors Reception, we present the Margaret Willard to a woman or women who have exemplified the traits of our predecessors, and in doing so honor all women. Past recipients have included Patricia Limerick, Val Havlick, Carlen Penfold, Ruth M. Wright, Claudine Garby, and Ceal Barry. All our honorees are exemplary role models who exercise initiative in their endeavors and in doing so bring honor to all women and to our University.

Recently employed by Chase Bank, Grazina was recognized as a Top Assistant Manager in Colorado and the West. Grazina is the single mother of a six-year old son and is active in the Lithuanian American Community of Colorado, volunteering as treasurer, providing financial education to members, and teaching Lithuanian at a Lithuanian school in Denver.

Ryan George Rasmussen, a history and political science major, graduated from Front Range Community College. While at Front Range he was founder and president of Students for Sustainability, a student club dedicated to raising awareness of sustainability and environmental issues. 

Margaret Willard began her career at CU as an English Instructor, wife of an history professor, and became the first president of the Faculty Wives' Club which has evolved into a more encompassing group, our University Women's Club. Though the original group liked to chat and sip tea, they grew in involvement in philanthropic matters. According to Sylvia Pettem, a Boulder local historian, these included providing eye-glasses and books to needy *students*, milk funds for schools, implementing student loans, and more.

The social aspects of their lives turned more and more to helping others as the world progressed through the Great Depression and World War 2. By 1957, they added fund raising and expanded the philanthropic work by providing financial scholarships for women, non-traditional females, who would not otherwise have been able to continue their education.

We continue this tradition and recently have included men for scholarship consideration. Now UWC has grown to include interest and service groups and accept all women whether they have a CU association or not.

Since 1993, in May, at the Honors Reception, we present the Margaret Willard to a woman or women who have exemplified the traits of our predecessors, and in doing so honor all women. Past recipients have included Patricia Limerick, Val Havlick, Carlen Penfold, Ruth M. Wright, Claudine Garby, and Ceal Barry. All our honorees are exemplary role models who exercise initiative in their endeavors and in doing so bring honor to all women and to our University.

- This is a campus rich in "life-changing" research—our faculty and staff earned \$380M in sponsored research last year.
- Economic recovery is slow and state funding is now ~2.5% of our budget; it is anticipated to go to 0% in 3-5 years.
- There are "three elements that are critical to the university and its success"—areas that are a current focus for the campus and were discussed in depth
 - O Enhancing the experience of ALL of our students
 - Establishing a diversified funding model
 - Observation Building and protecting our reputation
- Five years after the launch of Flagship 2030, our Boulder campus strategic plan, we see significant progress. (Chancellor DiStefano's address outlines many accomplishments.)
- "Coming together" and combining efforts—collaboration across the campus(es)—is crucial.

Complete details are in the report. I encourage you to read it.



President's Message

The University of Colorado!

When many of us think of the University of Colorado (CU), we think mostly, or only, of the Boulder campus. This is perhaps logical in that we live in Boulder and we are exposed to this campus through many means, such as music, theater and dance and athletic events. Many women in the UWC also audit courses so they experience, first hand, the fine academic offerings available and the excitement of being back in the classroom. It is a varied and wonderful place—the one with which we are likely most familiar.

But the university is an institution of four campuses, each quite distinct in its character. With this column, **Part I**, I'm only going to briefly touch on two of them—our <u>Denver</u> <u>Campus</u> and the <u>Colorado Springs Campus</u>. I'll discuss the CU Anschutz Medical and Boulder campuses in future columns. What I present here and the next two months is by no means comprehensive in content—it's mostly what is top of mind for me; it's my snap shot perspective. I hope it serves to give you a better 'flavor' of the campuses that make up our University of Colorado.

The **Denver Campus (UC Denver)**, with which some of you are familiar, is in the heart of downtown and has grown and prospered over recent years, serving both traditional and non-traditional degree and non-degree students who live both on and off campus. Diversity in the student body abounds. This campus offers a comprehensive education to its students, at all degree levels, through numerous programs.

- In the past couple of years, the new Business School building on Lawrence has opened, offering a fine facility and enhancing educational offerings in the campus neighborhood. This building houses the new and unique JPMorgan Center for Commodities. Areas of finance, public policy and economics are studied here, and the trading floor affords students first-hand experience in the commodities markets.
- The campus' proximity to local businesses, non-profit organizations and government makes it an ideal blend of the academic with the practical, allowing internship and class project opportunities, in all disciplines, for engaged students.
- A new Science Building on the Auraria campus (at Speer and Lawrence) is a collaborative effort between UC-Denver, Metro State and the CC of Denver. It's as beautiful as it is functional.
- The Office of Veteran Student Services supports military students and those making the transition into the private sector. (Please note my mention of the Boots to Suits program in a prior column.



The **Colorado Springs Campus (UCCS)** has grown dramatically over the last decade--to almost 10,000 oncampus students. New programs abound, and new academic buildings and residence halls have proliferated at an astonishing rate at this expanding and beautiful institution (check out their website). Degrees at all levels are offered; you feel the vitality when on campus. UCCS prides itself on its smaller class sizes and its involvement with the community. The school has close ties with the US Olympic operation as well as military entities in the region (and is considered very 'military-friendly').

- It touts some unique programs such as geropsychology, sports and professional golf management, programs that blend engineering and business (such as the Bachelor of Innovation), Homeland Security, and it has traditionally strong programs in nursing and public affairs.
- The campus recently opened the Heller Center for Arts & Humanities on homesteaded land, with a beautiful adobe house and surrounding structures, adjacent to the UCCS campus on Austin Bluffs. The property came to the university from the estate of artist Larry and Dot Heller. It is a venue for all sorts of events related to the campus. In addition to the Heller Center, there is a wonderful university art gallery—GOCA (Galleries of Contemporary Art)--on campus.
- UCCS has an active athletic program and, while the Boulder campus has Ralphie, they also have a live mascot named Clyde—a 165 pound rescued mountain lion that came from Montana. (He lives off-campus!)
- The UCCS Chancellor's goal is to make her campus 'the premier regional university in the country.' The school has a tremendous positive economic impact on the region.

The University of Colorado-Anschutz

Last month, I talked a bit about the <u>University of Colorado Denver Campus</u> and the <u>Colorado Springs Campus</u>. Below is **Part II** of my discussion, again from my perspective, of the <u>CU Anschutz Medical Campus</u>.

The **CU Anschutz Medical Campus**, located on the site of the old Fitzsimons Army Medical Center, has been built from scratch with the exception of the iconic Building 500 (built in 1941) which still stands. The campus has grown tremendously over recent years, outpacing the goals for expansion that were laid out for it in the early part of the last decade. New buildings and facilities abound. If you've not been down there, I'd suggest that you take the opportunity to drive through the campus and visit—astonishing. I'm going to hit here on some of the parts of the campus with which I'm most familiar and which may have special interest to our membership. If you visit, you will probably find areas that I've not included here—the place is just so dynamic.

- Recently, for the second straight year, the University of Colorado Hospital (UCH) was named the highest-performing academic hospital in the nation for delivering quality healthcare by the University Health System Consortium.
- Known for the fact that much of what happens at this campus is "lab bench to bedside" -tremendous advances are being made here in the areas of cancer, cardiovascular care, and stem cell research. The Cancer Center offers top notch care and access to clinical trials that can greatly benefit outcomes. The Cardiac and Vascular Center is known for fine cardiovascular care and is nationally recognized for its cardiology and cardiac surgery programs. The Gates Center for Regenerative Medicine and Stem Cell Research houses a dynamic group of researchers and practitioners who are working on cures for many diseases and are also focusing on establishing spin-off companies to benefit science, the university, and society.
- The *Executive Health Program* is something with which you might want to be familiar. Screenings are done down at the campus in one day. The physical is private pay. However, if you continue your care there, your insurance begins immediately.



The cost is about \$3,200 for the screening and may be a bit higher for men. The cost also varies a bit if you request special screening that is out of the ordinary. They do



check with each patient to see if there is something of special concern, and they include that screening in the workup.

- Many find this physical well worth the cost. I have a friend whose husband is now receiving the proper cardiac care, and has dramatically reduced his risk, as a result of the screening he received there. Please contact Logan Windram at 720-848 -2460 or Sarah Kabat at 720-848-2460 if you wish to discuss the possibility of participation further.
- The University of Colorado Eye Center is located in the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Institute (RMLEI) building. They specialize in diagnosis and treatment of vision-threatening eye diseases but can provide routine services, as well.
- The University of Colorado Depression Center is a part of the National Network of Depression Centers. It's dedicated to benefitting the lives of people with depression and mood disorders. The center encompasses clinical, research, community and education components. It was established at Anschutz in 2008 with the generous support of Vail resident George Wiegers.
- The campus also houses fine schools of dental medicine, nursing, pharmacy and a new Colorado School of Public Health—a joint venture of CU, CSU and Northern Colorado.
- There are close affiliations with other institutions at the Anschutz campus—Children's Hospital Colorado (CHC), Denver Veterans Administration Hospital (VA), Denver Health Hospital (DH), and the Lions Eye Institute mentioned above.
- President Benson has worked tirelessly and effectively to get appropriate transportation patterns into, and signage related to, this magnificent campus.

- The College of Music offers an abundance of 'listening' (and visual) opportunities. The Artist Series goes from fall thru spring and is varied in the programs it brings on campus. The resident Takacs Quartet is so popular that it's hard to obtain tickets. The Jazz program prospers with both Ensembles (bigger band) and Combos performances. And the free Faculty Tuesday concerts during the school year in the evenings, featuring Boulder faculty, are often not to be missed.
- Boulder's Museum of Natural History on campus is a gem. My young grandkids love it and the special weekend children's programs that they have. Their director, Patrick Kociolek, is a very creative fellow. He came to us from the California Academy of Sciences where he led their construction of a marvelous Renzo Piano building.
- The Conference on World Affairs has been a springtime highlight on campus for decades. Each year 'the conference' hosts over 100 international speakers and conducts over 200 sessions during the week-long event. Panelists are unpaid, are a part of 5-7 panel sessions over the week, and stay with local 'housers.' There is much interaction among themselves and with the community. Moderators of the many panels (on all sorts of topics) come from the Boulder area.
- The Center of the American West is within the College of Arts & Sciences. It "takes as its mission the creation of forums for the respectful exchange of ideas and perspectives in the pursuit of solutions to the regions difficulties." It sponsors important series and speakers for the community on such topics as the Secretaries of the Interior, Modern Indian Identity, our lands, energy needs, and water. Patty Limerick, a historian and recipient of a MacArthur Fellowship, leads the Center and provides an opportunity for it to take part in important regional and national dialogues.
- Certainly, one of our claims to fame is the relationship that the campus has to the national labs in/around Boulder. Many members of the UWC have close associations with these entities— NCAR, NIST and NOAA. NREL is nearby in Golden, CO. (I'll let you look up their full names on your own.) The scientists in these labs frequently have joint appointments at the university. The labs provide rich experiences for faculty and graduate students and are a source of employment for graduates.
- There are now 11 separate research institutes on campus which deal in every scientific area imaginable—the environment; behavioral genetics; behavioral and cognitive science; atmospheric and space physics; standards and technology; renewable and sustainable energy; biotechnology; and technology, learning and society. These research institutes account for over half of the sponsored research funding coming to the campus annually—last year that amount was ~\$380M (over \$800M for the system as a whole).
- The campus is a top provider of Peace Corps volunteers among all US colleges and universities. CU-Boulder students are an adventurous bunch.

President's Message continued



The fact that we are members in the UWC entitles us to purchase a Buff OneCard that lets us eat in university dining services facilities, at a discount, after we 'put' money on the card—to me, that means the UMC cafeteria or C4C (the Center for Community, which has terrific food). The card also entitles us to use the Norlin Library on site (but not off-campus remotely). It is tied to a CU email account, which we can use or not, as we choose. Interested members should contact Kathleen Salzberg. UWC members are 'sponsored' for a year at a time. Cards need to be renewed annually for \$5, and Kathleen needs to notify OIT and verify that the interested person is still a member, and thus eligible for the associated email account and related privileges, by October 31 each year. (There may have been a statement in an earlier issue of *MESSAGES* regarding this option, as well.)

There is an emphasis on all four of our campuses on being collaborative across units, and it's a goal for the system to work together--across campuses. A good example here is biotech, where all four campuses are involved in complementary ways in this initiative. Headquartered in Boulder at the BioFrontiers Institute on the East Campus, what happens on each campus and as a composite has much importance for the university, the region, the state and our nation.

It's convenient to look at what fundamentally happens on all of the campuses, which are varied and diverse, as consisting of four pillars—Learning & Teaching, Discovery & Innovation, Community & Culture, and Health & Wellness. They represent the central things that are happening at CU--programs can fit into single or multiples of these categories. This was the thinking about the university that evolved as the staff of the CU Foundation was planning the *Creating Futures* system-wide capital campaign which is currently in progress.

It's important for us to remember that the overall annual economic impact of the University of Colorado on the state of Colorado is over \$5B. And new companies are constantly being established based on CU faculty discoveries. Our university is a pretty special place.



Honors Tea ... and Margaret Willard

Margaret Willard began her career at CU as an English Instructor. The wife of a history professor, she became the first president of the Faculty Wives' Club which has evolved into a more encompassing group, our University Women's Club. Though the original group liked to chat and sip tea, they grew in involvement in philanthropic matters.

According to Sylvia Pettem, local historian, these included providing eye-glasses and books to needy students, milk funds for schools, implementing a student loan program, and more. The social aspects of the Faculty Wives turned more and more to helping others as the world progressed through the Great Depression and World War 2. By 1957, they added fund raising and expanded their philanthropic work by providing scholarships for women, non-traditional female students, who would not otherwise have been able to continue their education. The current University Women's Club continues this tradition and recently included men for scholarship consideration. The UWC has grown to include interest and service groups, and has opened membership to all women whether they have a CU association or not.

Since 1993, in May at the UWC Honors Tea, we recognize a woman or women who exemplify the traits of our predecessors, and in doing so we honor all women. Past recipients have included Patricia Limerick, Val Havlick, Carlen Penfold, Ruth M. Wright, Claudine Garby, and Ceal Barry. 

The UWC's Scholarship.....History, Selection, and More ...

In 1982, the University Women's Club established a scholarship fund to help nontraditional students at CU Boulder achieve their educational goals. Funds come from *your* individual donations. As of 2013, more than \$156,000 has been awarded to 101 CU-Boulder students.



Who is eligible for a UWC scholarship?

- a CU-Boulder student, Colorado resident
- who is at least 24 years of age
- an undergraduate working toward 1st bachelor's degree
- a student who completed at least 12 semester hours at CU-Boulder with a 3.0 GPA or better
- plans to enroll full time for both semesters of the scholarship year.

How do students apply?

Students apply online. The CU computer system is sophisticated and can identify immediately if a student is eligible for our scholarship based on the above criteria. The student is invited to complete a standard application form which qualifies him/her for the UWC scholarship and any other scholarship for which he/she is eligible. Application deadline is March 1.

How does the UWC select student scholars?

The Scholarship Office provides the UWC Scholarship Committee with eligible student applications in mid-March. The Committee members review the applications and rank the students based on several criteria: financial need, initiative, leadership, and service. The amount of the award is based on the UWC budget for that fiscal year. Students are notified of their award and invited to the Scholarship Luncheon where they are recognized.

How do students receive the money we've awarded?

The UWC Treasurer transfers the scholarship funds to the CU Foundation in July and the funds are then transferred to the University and the student's account. Half of the scholarship is transferred in the fall and half in the spring. Students must be enrolled full time.

Where does the UWC get the scholarship money?

YOU! Your donations provide scholarships for CU students. Congratulations to you for increasing your donations in recent years. **UWC awarded \$4,000 in 2002 and \$17,000 in 2013 — a 300% increase.** Keep up the good work!
