Advent Calendar - 1 yard neutral colored burlap, small dowel (18-20" in length), either 9 x 12 inch green felt or green magic marker, a red magic marker and odds and ends of felt, etc. for tree decoration.

Red Felt Boot - 1/4 yard of red felt, a one pound coffee can, a piece of ribbon 3/8" to 1/2" wide to lace front of boot.

Felt Ornaments - Multi-colored pieces of felt, matching embroidery or regular thread. Filler (polyester fill, old nylons, cotton balls, etc). Scraps of trim, lace, etc.

Christmas Tree Skirt - 1 1/4 yard of 72" felt. 8 5/8 yards of 1" wide metallic fringe trim. One piece of 9 x 12 felt for stars, one piece of 9 x 12" felt for angels, one piece of 9 x 12" felt for halos and wings.

Name: Constitution and By-Laws of
THE UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S CLUB - BOULDER
(Revised 1976)

Art. 1 shall be revised to read: "The name of this organization shall be The University Women's Club - Boulder."

Art. 3, Sec. 1 shall be revised to read: "Membership shall be open to the wives of any employees or persons connected with the University of Colorado - Boulder and/or any women employed by or connected with the University of Colorado - Boulder."

Art. 4, Sec. 1 shall be revised to read: "The elected officers shall be President, President-elect, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer. The President elect, Assistant Secretary, and Assistant Treasurer are elected to serve a two year term, the second year to be served as President, Secretary, and Treasurer respectively."

Art. 4, Sec. 2 shall be added and shall read: "If there is a meeting charge to members, the guest will be expected to pay the same amount."

Art. 4, Sec. 4 shall be added and shall read, "The wife of the Chancellor shall be an honorary member of the Club."

Art. 5 shall be revised to read, "The month and time of the meetings during the academic year shall be set by the President with approval of the Executive Board."

Art. 6, Sec. 1 shall be revised to read, "Amendments to the Constitution may be made by a two-thirds vote of those members present at a regular meeting of the Club, provided notice of intention to amend has been given at any previous regular meeting, or by mail at least three weeks prior to the vote."

Art. 7, Sec. 1 shall be revised to read, "The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall govern the Club in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws or the special rules of order of this Club."

Art. 8 shall be revised to read, "This revised Constitution shall be in effect with the first term of the academic year 1976-77 upon the affirmative vote of a two-thirds majority of the members present at the regular meeting in May, 1976 and shall supersede all previous Constitutions and By-Laws."

The By-Laws shall be amended as follows:

Art. 1, Sec. 1b shall be revised to read, "Standing Committees shall be: Hospitality, Membership, Publicity, Hostess for Campus Tours, Messages Editor, Social, Interest Groups, Program, Transportation, Library Volunteers, Projects and Wardenburg Student Health Center Service Group. The President shall appoint the chairmen and the President-elect shall appoint the assistant chairmen of the standing committees. The size of standing committees shall be left to the discretion of each chairman. The President shall appoint such special committees as the Club's activities may require."

Art. 1, Secs. 1d and 1e shall be deleted.

Art. 1, Sec. 1f shall become Sec. 1d and shall be revised to read, "Each Executive Board member shall submit three (3) typewritten copies of her annual report, one for the President, one for the President-elect, and one for the incoming officer or chairman."

Art. 1, Sec. 2a shall be revised to read, "Election of officers shall take place at the March meeting of the Club."

Art. 1, Sec. 2b shall be revised to read, "A nominating committee of five members, one from the Board, one representing new members and three others from the Club at large, shall be appointed by the Board and announced preceding election of officers (remainder unchanged)."

Art. 1, Sec. 3 shall be revised to read,

"Vacancies:

a. In case of a vacancy in the office of the President, the President-elect shall succeed to the Presidency and will continue in that office for the remainder of the academic year in which the vacancy occurred and during the following academic year which would have been her normal term as President.

b. A vacancy in the office of President-elect shall be filled by election at the next regular meeting of the Club, except that should the vacancy be created because of the vacancy in the Presidency, the election of the President-elect will be held at the regular election of officers.

c. A vacancy in any other elective office shall be filled by the assistant to that office, and that assistant will continue for the remainder of the academic year in which the vacancy occurred and during the following academic year which would have been her normal term in office. A vacancy in the assistant elective office will be filled in the same manner as is the vacancy in the office of the President-elect in "b", above.

d. Vacancies in appointive offices shall be filled by the President and vacancies in assistant appointive offices by the President-elect."


Art. 3, Sec. 1 shall be revised to read, "Annual dues are determined by the Executive Board."

Art. 4, Sec. 1 shall be revised to read, "Any members desiring to bring guests to a regular meeting of the Club shall pay fifty cents for each guest to the Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer on the day of the meeting."

Art. 4, Sec. 2, the words "The Sponsor and the President of Newcomers' Group" is to be deleted.

Art. 5, Sec. 2, which deals with the Newcomers' Group is to be deleted since that group no longer functions.
