1918 marked the beginning of construction of Hellems. Hellems was the first fuilding on campus to feature Charles Klauder's rural Italian architecture which sets apart the beauty and continuity of our C.U. campus. In addition, Hellems serves as the entry to the Mary Rippon Theatre. Mary Rippon was a woman who played a prominent role in the early history of C.U.

The flame at the top of the logo is an integral part of the C.U. seal just as University Women play an integral role in a part of the University of Colorado. We hope you like it.

We hope many of you will join us for what promises to be an entertaining evening. Remember -- spouses and guests are especially welcome at this event.




