She hopes to seek a Master of International Public Health degree, specializing in maternal and child health.

Nancy Dawson is presently a graduate student in journalism. She received a Bachelor's degree in sociology from C.U. in 1972. Her varied experiences of the past twelve years include leader in neighborhood improvement projects in Philadelphia, coordinator for local food co-op, leader of women's workshops, teacher of G.E.D. classes and other activities in a women's center.
