
Dear Members,




PLACES OF INTEREST

# FEBRUARY 5 TOUR OF THE CU HERITAGE CENTER

"As I dust a dance favor or point out an old letter-sweater, I think of the young people who received or wore them—the books they read, the teachers they met, the fun they had, the deadlines, and the hard work. I think about the campus, how beautiful and silent it can be in the snow. I think about all of the people before me who have been grateful for the same place in time.

"I like working here and look forward to sharing the experience with you."






