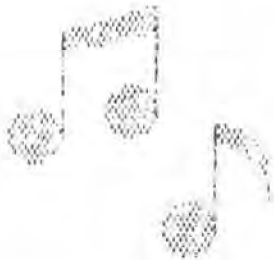
Dear University Women's Club Members,

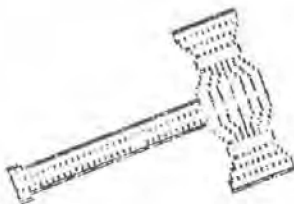

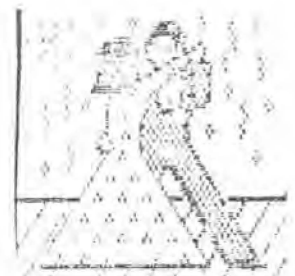
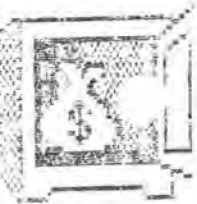

**SPONSORED BY THE UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S CLUB ART FORUM**

The University Women's Club of Boulder has been awarding scholarships to deserving women since 1982. The scholarship was created to encourage women who have interrupted their education to return to complete their degrees.

To date, a total of 13 scholarships totalling \$7,750 have been awarded. This is an average of \$550 per scholarship.

Even though it is small, the award of our scholarship is seen as providing real financial aid and offering valuable encouragement to the women who have received it.

One of our scholarship winners sent us the following note of appreciation:

My sincerest thank you to the University Women's Club for your recognition and financial support, which is very important not only to me, but to women in general. Having important goals and living strongly committed to them drastically changed the course of my future; but without the help and support I have been so generously offered by you and others like you, my dreams would not become a reality. I believe strongly that the realization of these goals will in some small way make the world a better place for all of us. So you could say your scholarship has made, or helped me made, the world a little better. On a personal level, my program is very competitive, and thus, high pressure. But the most stressful part has been figuring out how to pay for all of it. Your scholarship will be of great help to me, and will make my senior year a bit easier for me. Moreover, this award is also needed recognition of many hours of hard work and sacrifice, and provides me with some added motivation and enthusiasm for the coming year. I am very proud and honored to be a University Women's Club Scholar! Again, my heartfelt thanks!

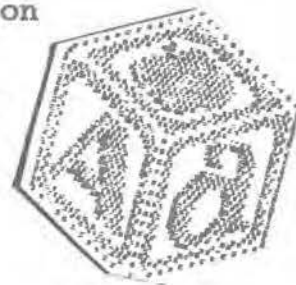

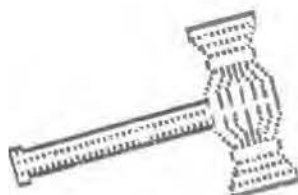

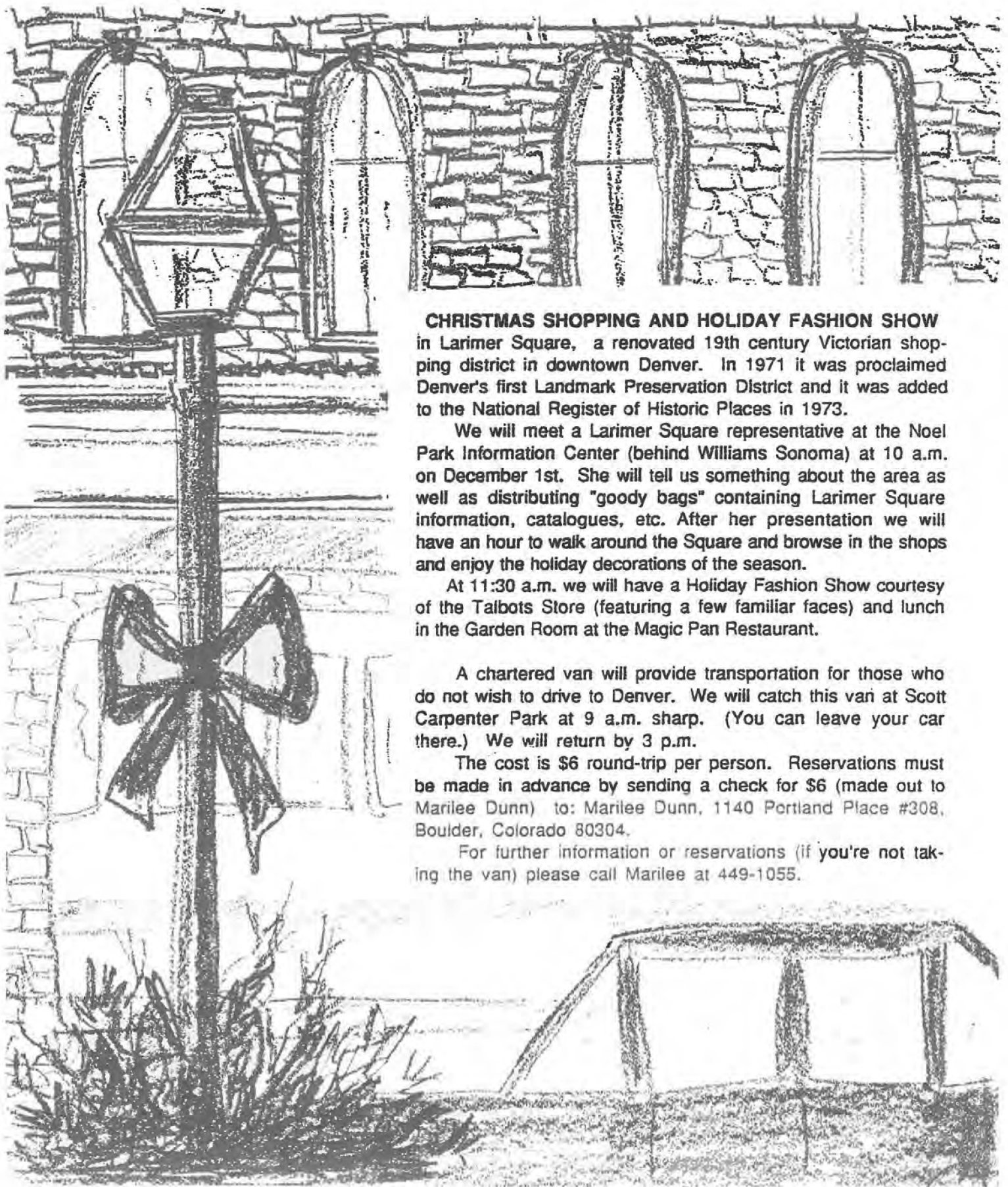

### CU Campus Earth Day

During the Spring of 1990, the CU Campus will be joining other campuses across the nation to celebrate Earth Day 1990. Planned to be an event of historic proportions. National Earth Day 1990 is intended to lift environmentalism into the mainstream of American thinking. Celebrities, rock stars, and sports heroes; as well as leaders of governments, will collaborate in an effort to raise environmental awareness.

Earth aid rock concerts, global theatre events, a technology exposition and an international environmental summit will be broadcast globally via the latest satellite uplink systems. State of the art communication hook-ups will create a global electronic village in which millions of people can mobilize to begin dealing with global warming, ozone depletion and other global problems.

The CU Campus is joining other campuses across the nation in plans to rouse faculty, staff, and students to new levels of environmental commitment. The CU Campus Earth Day Steering Committee is organizing a pledge campaign in which campus departments and individuals are encouraged to make pledges as a gesture toward Earth Day. Pledges can range from promising to use recycled paper, copying on both sides of paper, and riding bicycles, to agreeing to stop using styrofoam in campus eating facilities, and refocusing coursework towards environmental concerns.

Events planned for April 20, Campus Earth Day, include musical, cultural and tree planting events, teach-ins, proclamations, and street demonstrations. Also planned is an environmental audit of the CU Campus.

Through these events, the Earth Day Steering Committee plans to start a brushfire of environmental awareness which will sweep through the campus leaving no one unaffected. Anyone who would like to join these efforts may call the Environmental Center, 492-8308.

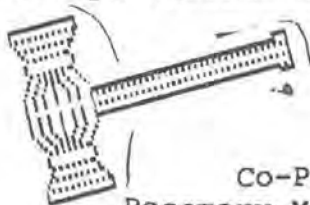
The nominating board has presented three names for our '92 Board. President: Claudine Garby, Secretary: Marsha Elwood, Treasurer: Marilyn Peltzer.
