

MEET OUR PRESIDENT

When Claudine Garby takes the reins of UWC this fall, she adds one more honor to the Garby family University of Colorado legacy. She is the wife of the late Dr. Louis Garby, who was a professor in aerospace engineering for 30 years; all four of her children are C.U. alums, as are a daughter-in-law and son-in-law, and she herself received her Ph.D. in Education Administration from CU in 1974.

Claudine has been a UWC member for a total of 32 years. We have seen more of her the past two years since she retired as Director of Elementary Education in the St. Vrain Valley School District. She maintained her membership throughout her demanding professional career which a includes a school principalship for 10 years. Before that, she was in and out of school since 1947, either furthering her own education, or working in education. (Her Master's degree was earned at the University of Michigan.)

Claudine is a pioneer in the teaching field. She started teaching in a one-room country school west of Jackson, Michigan, Kindergarten to 8th grade, with her oldest student only two-and-a-half years younger than she. She was there at the crack of dawn, to start the fire! "We had an outside water pump and an outside john," she says. Her student and/or teaching experiences span 42 years, with only 11 years "off" to raise a family.

A totally different career is her current one, of three years -- that of Businesswoman! She and her son, Gage, founded Senetics, Inc., which sells a product based on her late husband's patent. "Counter Cap" is a medical bottle cap that records the number of times people take their medicine and is sold at Safeway, King Soopers, and Payless Drug Stores.

Michigan is still in her blood - Claudine misses the lakes and boating. She loves to travel, is an avid reader, and enjoys the theater and going to symphonies.

SERIES TO EXAMINE

EVOLVING ROLES OF WOMEN

In our lecture series this year, we will embark on an examination of the evolving roles of women in modern society and in doing so, develop a clear perspective of where we have arrived in this last decade of the 20th Century. The resources available to us in pursuing this mission are so rich that we shall continue with the program focus at least through Spring of 1993. That will bring us right up to the beginning of the UWC Diamond Jubilee! It is fitting that we enter a celebration of our own 75-year history with a heightened awareness of the road we have travelled and insights into the miles ahead.

The 1991-92 lecture-luncheon season will begin October 8 with the laying of a foundation of understanding by Dr. Anne Costain, CU Professor of Political Science and Acting Assistant Vice-Chancellor for Research. Dr. Costain is a President's Teaching Scholar and winner of the SOAR award for teaching excellence given by undergraduate students, and recently received a grant from the National Science Foundation to study the women's movement. She will address the topic "What Women Want: The Changing Agenda of the Women's Movement."

The series continues **November 12** with a view of the position of women and women studies at CU in a dual presentation by **Dr. Marcia Westkott**, Director of Women Studies, and **Dr. Roberta Flexer** of the Math Education Department. On **February 11, Dr. Dorothea El-Mallakh** will discuss the status of women today in the countries of North Africa and the Middle East. The first season of this "women's inquiry" will conclude on **March 10** with a **panel discussion** by women who are leaders in the community of Boulder.

We salute their dedication and hard work, and are happy and proud to encourage them with our modest scholarship!

LECTURE/LUNCHEON SERIES CONTINUES

The next lecture/luncheon, Tuesday, November 12, at 11:30 (note earlier start), will provide us the rare opportunity of hearing a dual presentation by two noted C.U. professors.

Dr. Marcia Westcott, director of Women Studies, Sociology professor, and author of the book, "The Feminist Legacy of Karen Horney," will discuss the status of women's issues at the University of Colorado, and "Women at CU: How Are We Doing?"

From Dr. Roberta Flexer, Associate Professor of Math. Education, we'll learn what kind of pressure CU women faculty and women staff members are putting on administration to bring about a more equitable status for women.

A report from the U.S. Department of Labor has concluded that the University of Colorado at Boulder violated three minor provisions of federal policies against discrimination. However, five separate discrimination complaints filed by CU-Boulder faculty members more than a year ago have been rejected, officials have confirmed.







It is Dr. Westcott's intent that the restored cottage be known as the Women's Building, and that its new Library/Commons be available for use by all UWC members.
