#### Notes From the President:

"Ladies of the Club Lay Down the Gavel and Call It A Good Night After a Glorious Reign of 72 Years"-Wall Street Journal, Friday, June 19, 1992. Several of you have mentioned this newspaper article which notes, with a certain sense of nostalgia, that not so very long ago women's clubs launched 75% of the nation's libraries and lobbied for child labor laws and women's suffrage. As Frances Barrett, the last president of the Women's Club of Clariton, Pennsylvania observes, "Times have changed. Women are working now and don't seem to have the time or desire to be clubwomen." It seems that members had enjoyed the camaraderie of other intelligent women while raising funds for scholarships and other community needs, "but few outside the club knew of its contributions as it seemed improper to brag.... After a forktender roast beef dinner, the members listened to the treasurer's final report, noting a \$15,000 donation to the Clairton library. Then, having packed away memories like pressed white gloves in tissue, they quietly adjourned. It was time to silently steal away into the night, said Mrs. Baird."

Well, the Boulder women of the University Women's Club long ago packed away their white gloves. This organization is strong and growing in this its 74th season! However, remaining as relevant for the 1990s as the Club was for the 1920s or 1950s or 1970s is a function of adaptation. Service and friendship are values that will never be outdated, but the service that we offer our university must relate to its very real needs today, and the structure we offer for nurturing friendships must answer the needs of the modern, sophisticated women that we are.

The 1992-93 UWC season is planned with these needs in mind. The Lecture-Luncheon Series will continue to look to women as resources in focusing on the evolving roles of women today. Our third Winter Party on December 4 will provide an unusual opportunity for the University community to come together in a spirit of friendliness and merriment. A' May UWC Honors Program will be the means of our recognizing women who have distinguished themselves with significant contributions to the University of Colorado. This year also signals the beginning of our alliance with the Women Studies Program as we contribute to the effort to save Cottage Number One. And in addition to the scholarships we give women from the funds we raise at the spring fashion show, we will be contributing to a Lyric Music Program scholarship. There will be more information in future Messages about all of these events and projects. I hope that many of you will be at Koenig Alumni Center on September 15th for the launching of this wonderful new season of friendship and service.

Media pundits are calling 1992 "the year of the woman." It really is a time when women are feeling emboldened, and we of the UWC are emboldened with the prospect of a healthy future in which women band together in order to enjoy the comraderie of other intelligent women and serve our community in significant, relevant ways.

### Notes From the President:

"CU today celebrates freedom of expression, the most basic of human rights."

-President Judith Albino, September 8, 1992

An extraordinary thing has just happened in our small town, in our amazing university community. The University of Colorado took a stand for human rights and freedom of expression in providing a safe and brilliant light in which Salman Rushdie, a man with a million-dollar price on his head, could step forward to be seen and heard. I saw many of you there-we were witnesses to and part of a security extravaganza at the CU Events Center that would seem to belong on the evening news, taking place somewhere else, not in pretty Boulder. I was proud of our President Judith Albino that night. Facilitating this complicated arrangement really did represent an act of tremendous courage, and I'm sure many of us would shiver if we knew the true particulars. The Salman Rushdie appearance was a dazzling beginning to the Novel of the Americas Symposium which with its central theme of freedom of expression is a source of much pride for all of us associated with CU.

As members of the University Women's Club, we have the opportunity to particippate in the collective pride in the activities of this university and in the positive culture that women offer to the community. Through our lecture/luncheon series we exercise both of these privileges as we welcome this season women speakers whose works provide insights that brighten our understanding of the exciting issues that surround us today. To start us thinking about the complicated roles we women play in our complex world and

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the part our college educations play in defining those roles, Dr. Margaret Eisenhart, an anthropologist from the School of Education, will address on October 13 the intriguing topic of "College Women and the Culture of Romance." Her research, presented in her book Educated in Romance: Women, Achievement, and College Culture (with co-author Dorothy Holland), is certainly cause for reflection. On November 10, we are to be especially honored in providing the forum for a truly sensational announcement by one of our own members, Toni Dewey. She is concerned with putting forth the true story of the women of the west, and the means for doing that will be her newsworthy announcement. A recent article in the Daily Camera spoke of this election year in terms of the "skirttails" that may sweep some candidates to victory and spoke of women being "energized as never before." We will be exploring that very issue in February after the election results are in and duly analyzed. The lecture/luncheon series will conclude in March with a topic that has been oddly addressed this year—family values—in an address from CU sociologist Dr. Martha Gimenez on "Changes in the Traditional Family Structure."

In addition to our ongoing service projects and interest groups, there is so much planned for this year that I hope everyone of us will find a place or two in this organization where the life of the mind as well as friendships will flourish. Seventy-four years old—this entitles the UWC to justifiable pride in a long and continuing tradition of service and fun!

# 1992 University Women's Club Scholarship Recipients

The UWC Scholarship Committee (Lavonne Casteel, Caryl Kassoy-Chair, Beverly Irons and Deborah Taylor) recommended three women to receive a scholarship for 1992. Some of you met one of these women, Ann May, who was the Club's guest at the Spring Fashion Show. Ann's plans at that time were to spend this academic year in Eastern Africa conducting ethnographic research. She wrote that, "My long-term goal is to live and work at the grassroots level in development, with African women especially, and to work within the framework of the cultures and traditions there." Ann has been a degree student in anthropology since 1989, taking classes part-time, and states that "adaptability and resourcefulness have been necessary components of my life experience."

A second scholarship was awarded to Theresa Nilsson, who lives in Longmont with her husband and four children, who range in age from six to twenty-two. Over the years, she has taught piano and cooking, worked as a police officer in Fort Collins, and led recreational therapy classes in a residential facility for developmentally disabled adults. She wrote, "I thoroughly enjoyed the privilege of being able to care for my children as a 'stay at home mom.' Now it is time for me to pursue additional interests." Theresa enrolled in the fall of 1990, and is pursuing a degree in environmental conservation. As a native of Colorado, she feels she is "intimately acquainted with and seriously concerned about the environmental future of our state."

The third recipient of the UWC Scholarship is Illana Gallon who lives in Boulder. Her background is in music, dance, and writing. For many years she has supported herself with a variety of secretarial jobs. She has worked for the CU Institute of Behavioral Sciences and for Florence Becker Lennon, the "Poet Laureate of Boulder." Illana has also volunteered in organizations dedicated to social change and to facilitating better understanding between diverse groups. Her educational goal is to study cross-cultural communication and conflict resolution, and "in some way to improving understanding among human beings."

Chautauqua Archives These are the new projects designed to assist in the archives at Chautauqua Park and to provide opportunities to work in the gift shop to be opened next summer to benefit the Chautauqua Association.

Campus Libraries Volunteers are needed to help students find books and to assist in the Reference Department, for two-hour stints per day, half-days, or possibly whole days. New volunteers will be trained by experienced workers.

The Cottage Project The CU Foundation is undertaking a major fundraising effort to renovate the Women's Studies Cottage No. 1. Volunteer help would be appreciated to screen lists, raise community awareness, and generally get involved.

Cook Book General clerical work for promoting and marketing a cook book.

Graduate Teacher Programs Volunteers are needed this year to plan or hold a dinner for foreign students, in the fall.

Heritage Center The museum needs volunteers for docent work and other kinds of tasks. A training program will be organized to acquaint volunteers with the museum.

Cookies are to be delivered to the kitchen of the Senior Center at 9th and Arapahoe before 11 a.m. the final Wednesday of each month.

Office of Student Disabilities Volunteers are needed as readers to blind students, wither for syllabi or tests, or for taping textbooks. Time is flexible, but possibly five hours a week may be required. Taping can be done either at home or at CU. Blind students have tape machines available.

Student Health Center There is a need for non-student volunteers in the Women's Health Care Center and in the Community Health Office. Volunteers will answer the telephone, work at a reception desk, and help individual students. New volunteers are also needed for educating students in AIDS awareness. This is a new priority effort for this year.



How do 1 sign up? The Service Projects will be coordinated this year by Betty Bonde, 443-1767. These projects are various ways that club members can be of service to the university community as well as the community at large. For information, or to sign up for any of the projects, please call Betty for assistance.

What is the Cottage Project? Cottage Number One, now the home of the Women Studies Program, was built in 1884 as one of four new buildings that year, and the first construction work after Old Main in 1876. Built as a women's dormitory, the building is one of the most historically significant buildings on the campus. An addition was constructed perhaps by 1890. The exterior of the structure appears to survive virtually intact from its 1890s configuration, although some ornamental elements may be missing. Many of the interior layouts and trim are also intact, although several walls are later alterations and some original doorways are now closed. Wood floors survive in many areas. Window casings, ceiling moldings, and doors appear to be original in many areas. It is now necessary to correct serious structural problems in the foundation of the Cottage and adapt the interior design to the future needs of the Women Studies Program. Where feasible, original design elements will be restored using a standard of high quality craftsmanship that is in keeping with the character of the historic workmanship.

#### Notes From the President:

"'Mongst all these stirs of discontented strife, O let me lead an academic life."

-Joseph Hall (1574-1656)

Twenty-four years of living in the nation's capitol did not prepare me for the peculiar brand of politics that brew on a university campus—many of you have heard me say this. However, despite a growing acceptance of this newly discovered fact of life, my permanent image of a university community is that formed by a very early television series. I can still whistle the theme song of "The Halls of Ivy" with Ronald and Benita Coleman, and it had to be the early 1950s as that actor with the heavenly voice died in 1958. Do any of you also remember the romantic, secure yet stimulating world of the college professor and his wife created by some long ago television script writer? What a fan this little girl was—of the wonderful Ronald Coleman and of a make believe ivy covered world!

Grown-up reality rarely lives up to childhood's dreams, but every once in a while there are brief shining moments when it can come close. When the community of people who make up that special world of academe come together, when the folks in physics join those in English literature and those in political science, a magic synergy can happen. And it must happen a lot—at lunchtime at the University Club, at athletic and cultural events. And one of those very, very special times is at our own event—the Winter Party. There is an atmosphere hearkening back to when the University of Colorado was a smaller place, when faculty and administrators really knew each other. Though unrelated to our more

serious purposes here, the Winter Party is still one of those times that makes one feel that there is no better place to be than on this college campus.

This year's party, "A Winter's Night at the Moulin Rouge," is being planned with fun and collegiality in mind. I hope every one of you will put it on your calendar for the night of December 4. It is still a bargain at just \$10 a ticket, making it an easy way to entertain a special friend or colleague. The Toulouse Lautrec look being created by artist member Lillian Kennedy is going to help give this evening its own special magic. 

#### Historically Speaking:

In the process of researching the history of our club I have read about the history of other women's organizations in Boulder. Many of these groups have made efforts to support education by providing financial assistance to local students.

The Women's League of the University of Colorado was organized in 1896 by Mrs. Jennie Baker and others as a support group for the female students at CU. In 1904, one of their first projects was to establish a loan fund for students—for which they had more demand than money!

The Colorado Federation of Women's Clubs reported in their first issue of *The Record* on November 15, 1920 that they had a scholarship fund which was used to provide loans to "girls desiring an education."

A loan fund for needy students was established by our club in 1919. In the 1960s this fund was very active, as evidenced by the treasurer's reports in the archives. It continues to be available to students in need today.

In 1982 the UWC created a scholarship fund from which awards were given to several female students each year. Most of these students are facing the pressures of family and work responsibilities in addition to their studies.

Our efforts continue a long tradition of support for education by women's organizations and perhaps reflect an awareness of how difficult it can be for women to reach their academic goals.

#### Notes From the President:

"Now, all of a sudden, Texas women are running whole cities, with multibillion-dollar budgets. Straight from 'Hey, honey' and 'yew cute li'l thang' to 'Madam Mayor' and 'Yes, Mayor, right away."

Scholars Arthur Schlesinger Jr., Kevin Phillips, and Todd Gitlin are not in complete agreement as to whether the year 1968 was a real watershed year or whether it was just a rather confusing turning point in modern American history—according to *The Sunday Camera's* January 10th article, "Remembering 1968 —The Year of Living Dangerously." However, they all agree that 1992 was a watershed year, a year after which the world looks forever different. It is hard, if not impossible, to achieve any real perspective yet on that year, just a few weeks over. And though 1992 was not full of the kind of tumult that made 1968 unforgettable to all of us who were older than 10 at the time, I had the feeling all year long that something was happening that was somehow different in 1992, different from the normal march of time.

We were told right from the beginning that 1992 was to be "The Year of the Woman." Was it? Was that part of what was happening? Will our history be forever different because women finally really did come of age in a world where power if brokered? Were major breakthroughs accomplished or was it just a few more small steps on what is to be a very long journey? Do we care? How much do we care? I know that these questions are hard for the sociologists, the political

scientists, the analysts of all sorts to get a firm handle on, but it is sometimes hard too for women to sort out their <u>feelings</u> about tradition and progress when it comes to viewing their complicated roles.

Molly Ivins points out that most women "started in areas 'traditional' for women: the schools—from the PTA to the school board is not that long a leap. Parks and recreation—from the garden club (never underestimate the garden clubs) and Girl Scout leadership to city parks and recreation is just a short hop... Pretty soon these ladies from the Junior League know an awful lot about how to raise money, organize, build coalitions, get publicity. Friends, they're in politics."

And don't underestimate an organization of women whose lives are tied to a great academic institution whose mission is facilitating the pursuit of truth and understanding (we hope). I really do feel it is our duty to participate in this particular quest to discover what is different for women now from what existed even one year ago! And that is what we are going to attempt to do on February 9th. Former Boulder Mayor Linda Jourgensen will lead a panel discussion in "1992: The Year of the Woman—Was It?" The more comfortable we become as women at examining our own lives and acknowledging our strengths (!), the more solid will be the reality of our increasingly strong voices in the worlds of politics and finance and of course Academe.



#### Notes From the President:

"This is the summer to paint your knees."
—the cover of Seventeen Magazine, June 1966

"This is the summer to paint your knees—the newest place for a new accessory!" I wrote that. And a lot more like it as a young staff writer at *Seventeen Magazine* in the mid '60s. I was newly arrived in New York City with new husband (same and only one as now), new college degree, and embarking on a new grown-up life. Well, the new husband was fine, but the glamorous world of fashion in sophisticated Manhattan made the new college degree seem useless and the new grown-up life seem trivial. Only in the last few years have I been able to talk about my experiences in that really deadly serious business of Fashion with a capital F. And I usually only speak quite anecdotally about it. Some of you have heard my small collection of stories.

Though I grew up in a family of well educated, thinking people, they are also people who love clothes—who make quite a big deal about the quality of fabric, the quality of workmanship, and the fineness of style. But having to make a living by coming up with such stuff as, "Kicking up a summer storm, the vinyl shoe shape is walking all over the place!," destroyed for me that sense of fashion as fun that my family held. However, it did make me pay attention over the years to any serious explanations I heard about the importance in our lives of this thing we call fashion.

My absolute favorite explanation is Alison Lurie's

The Language of Clothes (1981, Vintage Books—a must read). "We can lie in the language of dress, or try to tell the truth; but unless we are naked and bald, it is impossible to be silent." Of course Alison Lurie means our clothes are speaking for us, whether we mean them to or not, but she obviously also thinks that it is a worthy subject and not a trivial pursuit. (Alison Lurie is a successful novelist and a prominent scholar—a Cornell University professor of English.)

We just can't help it—fashion is fascinating!

In that family of mine, the Janssen men were just as interested as the women in nice clothing (my Pelton man is a different story). Lots of men are like the Janssens. And this year the UWC is going to accommodate the fascination that women and men have with the language of clothes and raise funds at the same time for our very important scholarship project at CU. We'll have an eye on the modern, busy world in which men and women are working side by side in this year's fashion fundraiser—Fashions from Boudoir to Boardroom. Mark April 20th on your calendar now, and start doing what you can to entice the men to come join in the celebration too! I at one time had some doubts as to the worthiness of a fashion show as an activity for university women, but I seem to be over that East Coast Angst now. This activity represents a legitimate participation in the interpretation of our times, and besides—as I now recall, fashion is fun!

#### UWC Scholarship Update:

In the October 1992 issue of *Messages* you were introduced to the three recipients of the 1992 UWC Scholarship. They are: Ann May (anthropology), Theresa Nilsson (environmental conservation), and Illana Gallon (crosscultural communication and conflict resolution).

After the bills were all paid from the fashion show, we were delighted to discover we had enough money to give one more scholarship. The recipient chosen was Lynn Roers. Lynn returned to college after working in the business world for seven years. She was a successful executive in mortgage banking but had an ongoing desire to earn a degree in sociology and an elementary teaching certificate. She has always loved children and feels concern for their future and well being as individuals. The University Women's Club is pleased to assist Lynn in receiving further education.

The University Women's Club created this scholarship fund in 1982. The money was to be used to encourage women who have interrupted their education to complete their degrees. The scholarship is open to female students

who are 24 years of age or older, who are Colorado residents, and who have completed at least 12 semester hours at the University of Colorado at Boulder with a grade point of 3.00 (B) or better since returning. Students apply to the scholarship through the Financial Aid Office at CU.

The scholarship is funded by individual donations and funds raised at our annual fashion show.

To date, a total of 23 scholarships totalling \$12,950 have been awarded. This is an average of \$563 per scholarship. Students from a variety of disciplines have received this financial aid.



Our fashion show has come a long way since 1957, and it never lost Ann's idea of bringing us together, evolving into an occasion that also brings the university and Boulder communities together to help in a worthy cause—that of directing funds toward scholarships for needy and deserving CU women.



#### Notes From the President:

"The social argument that has filled two decades is not about the behavior of rats in mazes, but about how women should live their lives and treat the people they love."

It is not just the scientists and columnists who have been lately peering under a microscope at *specimen femella*. Why, it's practically a national pastime. We all need to come to these discussions prepared with more than just gut feeling and decades of comfortable habits. Popular columnist Ellen Goodman points out that, "shifting winds of the social argument, blowing pros and cons at us, all too easily raise the hackles of our own anxieties."

During my tenure as UWC president, I have observed a few telltale hackles. But I am convinced that an organization of women centered around a university is one of the best places—both safe and stimulating—to examine and enjoy the female life. I came to this office a little embarrassed to be heading something called a women's club. And I still don't like the word "club"—it smacks of exclusivity (and that's what I hated about my sorority life in college). As I have seen the ways in which women representing a significant radius of ages, experiences, political persuasions, occupations and avocations can meet, share ideas, work together, support each other, I see that we are fortunate. This is not the kind of opportunity most men ever experience. I know that it contributes to our ability to combat the doubtfulness that in these odd times "can swamp self-confidence and even friendships." (Ellen again)

In my first "Notes" last September, I recounted a June '92 Wall Street Journal story about the Women's Club of Clariton, Pennsylvania, which after 72 years had fallen victim to changing times and were, as they quaintly observed of themselves, silently stealing away into the night. Don't you think they jumped the gun? Weren't they all too impulsive? If ever women needed each other and if ever communities needed women working together to help create some sanity, now is surely that time. If the energy of organized women was important in 1920, it is no less so today.

Our own women's club is about to embark on its next 75 years. And I am positive that we are up to the challenge of remaining relevant while providing a haven of friendship and shared opportunities! I'll bet we're nowhere near truce signing in the 20th century gender battles, but I for one am glad to be part of a grouping of women that allows an inside view and promotes an ever expanding understanding of ourselves. I would hate to be looking at us as rats in a maze.

I must sign off once again with the ever irreverent Molly Ivins. "They sang and laughed and greeted one another with that peculiar female Texan greeting call that sounds like calling pigs, 'OOOOOOOooooo, honeee, how good to see yew again!' " Most of us in Colorado won't sound like that, but we'll be mighty glad to see each other next September when we can start another lively season—the 75th— of the University Women's Club.
