Dear UWC Friends:



Where has all the time gone? I thought I would have all summer long to write and rewrite my first greeting to you, but the days have just flashed before my eyes! I hope you have had a glorious, fun-filled, lazy, what-ever-you wanted summer. I for one had a most unusual experience which taught me a very important lesson. You know the old saying: "it's never too late to learn?" Please allow me to indulge myself.

After moving to Boulder in 1986, my two sons and husband participated for three years in the Denver Post "Ride The Rockies" Bike Tour. For the past four years, they designed their own more grueling four-day tour with 35 or so other local crazies. This is their thing. I wish them a safe trip as I ponder my to do list; Item number one: close the door to the kitchen.

The tour itinerary is made months in advance and money is paid up front for the food, support van, motel accommodations, etc.. You can imagine the consternation in our family when, two days before departure, son Andrew announces that he cannot participate in the last two days of the trip because his summer research project commands his presence in the lab. "No refunds," the tour director says. "No problem," I say without thinking. "I'll go! I'll ride what I can ride and flag down the van when I've had enough." The arrangements are made. I am to meet the tour Thursday afternoon in Antonito, Colorado. Andrew will take my mountain bike out of the car, put in his streamline, light-as-a-feather touring bike and drive back to Denver the following morning.

Thursday a.m. I run to Performance Bike Shop to buy the required black girdle. I shall use Andrew's helmet and gloves. My Visha Sedlack walking shoes are perfect just in case I want to "walk" a little of the ride. I'm ready!

Friday a.m. Andrew's last minute tip as he's strapping my shoes into the pedals, "keep your back flat and remember one turn at a time!" What does that mean, I wonder as I suddenly realize I have started the 62 miles, 2 mountain pass tour to Chama, NM. (The longest ride I've ever taken was eight leisurely miles on the Boulder Creek bike path.)

You can guess the rest of the story. I finished day one and, believe it or not, (I still don't), I rode all of day two, a 100 mile century ride to Taos. After ten and a half mind numbing hours, I knew exactly what "one turn at a time meant". I also learned what it means to have the wind in your favor.

The lesson? You can guess that, too. You don't know what you are capable of until you try. Had I not made it, and I was certainly prepared not to, I still would have the satisfaction of knowing I was still game to try something new, to challenge myself. It was a real psychological journey!

I would like to ask you to take "the trip" this year. Become an involved member of the UWC. There are many facets of our organization which can challenge you physically and mentally. No, I'm not starting an interest group for biking, but I am inviting you to participate in one or more of the 23 interest groups, 10 service projects, four lecture/luncheon series. There is much to enjoy, many intelligent women with whom to share your ideas and many ways to serve our community. Your UWC Board and chairpersons are already working diligently to prepare a stimulating year. Read all about our activities in our monthly Messages. I'm looking forward to this exciting tour!





### Winter Party '94 - GAUDY NIGHT - Friday, November 18, 1994

"The worst sin - perhaps the only sin - passion can commit, is to be joyless."

Dorothy L. Sayers, Gaudy Night

Imagine that for just one evening our world of academe is far from the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. It's 1935, and we're gathered for an evening of camaraderie, music, fine food, and drinks in the Senior Common Room of the fictional Shrewsbury College at Oxford University. Lord Peter Wimsey and Harriet Vane are here too, of course - just in case anything strange or mysterious happens!


Writer Dorothy L. Sayers drew on her own experiences as a student in Oxford's first female college, Sommerville, to create <u>Gaudy Night</u>, her masterpiece of classic British mystery. If you are a Sayers fan, then you are most certainly a fan of Lord Peter and Harriet, who with brains, wit and style are able to fathom solutions to the puzzles of many of Sayers' wonderful tales. 



Coach Barry , the winningest coach in CU women's basketball history, has taken the Colorado Women's Basketball program into the national spotlight over her 11 year tenure in Boulder. For the seventh-straight season, the team has finished in the top three of the conference, ending the regular season at the top spot for the second-straight season with a 12-2 outing. Colorado advanced to the NCAA tournament for the fifth time under Barry's tutelage, returning to the Sweet 16 for the second consecutive year.

Her 1994 accomplishments, including a school record Number 7 national ranking, were recognized on the national level when she was named National Coach of the Year by the United States Basketball Writers Association and by Basketball America. These honors complemented her third Big Eight Coach of the Year award.



### **WOMEN'S COTTAGE #1 LUNCHEON**

Maybe you haven't noticed the charming gingerbread trim and decorative ironwork of the little house on campus next to the Economics Building. You can't get a good look at it from your car buzzing by on Broadway. But if you walk along that particular section of sidewalk, you will discover one of the

unpolished gems of the CU Boulder campus.

Women's Cottage #1 was built in two phases, in 1884 and 1885, to house women students. Cottage #1 is the last of the four original women's dormitories on campus. The dining hall could seat 100 people when the building was first occupied. In 1910, Cottage #1 was the home of two student organizations, the YWCA and Women's League. The Home Economics Department occupied the second floor in 1920. Currently, the building is the home of the Women's Studies Program and provides classroom and office space for the English Department. This building has a rich history, and the CU Foundation has a plan to save it from deterioration and restore it as a historic landmark on the Boulder campus. Twenty-five club members and other interested women met for lunch on January 10th to discuss the funding of the renovation of Women's Cottage #1. A representative of the CU Foundation, Diane Greenlee, told the history of the building, described the necessary work, and explained the progress of the project. Research on the renovation of Cottage #1 began in 1989. Subsequently, a plan was approved by the CU Board of Regents and the appropriate Legislative committees. Foundation Officer, Carroll Bowman, distributed copies of the proposed conceptual floor plan for the building. The renovation will result in a beautiful historic structure that satisfies the needs of modern educators and meets the state guidelines for campus buildings. Plans include excavation of the basement for additional storage, repair of a deteriorating and inadequate foundation, and landscaping to correct a drainage problem. The building will be renovated to satisfy current building codes and provide access to the handicapped. Original woodwork, fireplaces, and the beautiful curved balustrade will be preserved. The interior of the building will be returned as closely to 1885 conditions as funds allow. Projected cost for the renovation of Women's Cottage #1 is \$1,000,000, explained Foundation Development Officer, Anne Marie Kemp. A fund raising steering committee first met in March, 1993, and began the process of securing the money necessary for the preservation of this important building. They are currently negotiating large gifts which will total \$800,000. In addition, the committee has secured a \$100,000 matching grant from the Colorado Historical Society. They have contacted a number of organizations in an effort to come up with the money to match that grant. As an incentive, donations of various amounts in excess of \$10,000 bring the opportunity to name a part of the building to honor an individual or group of the donor's choice.

Ms. Greenlee thanked us for the opportunity to present this project to the UWC, a group with a long history of dedication and service to the University. She said, historically, women have not seen themselves as donors, particularly not to a project of this type. The Foundation representatives emphasized the natural connection between CU women's history and our Club, which has been a part of the University community for 75 years. She encouraged us to discuss the role the UWC might play in raising funds to preserve Women's Cottage #1. Club President, Karen Diamond, agreed that we would explore the possibilities. President-elect, Caryl Kassoy, reminded us that the UWC Board voted to

support this project two years ago.

Thanks to the efforts of the Foundation, Women's Cottage #1 will be restored. The CU Boulder campus building will once again sparkle and shine. What are your thoughts on the project? How do you feel about the possibility of the UWC "polishing" our campus gem? Club members who wish to make a donation or have ideas, suggestions or comments on this project, should contact President Karen Diamond or Board member Jane Butcher.







Since its construction in 1884, Cottage No. 1 has served as a gathering place for women. During the pioneer days of the University, the Cottage provided sleeping rooms for twelve women students, a bath, and an office for the chaperone. In 1902, Mary Elwell (later Mrs. Fred Folsom) described her life in the dormitory: "We had to furnish our own rooms. The only thing in them was a small stove for heat and to give us hot water. The University furnished a boy to carry wood and coal to the doors of our rooms... There was only one entertaining room, and it was very small. We used to fight to see who would get the room for the evening." At that time, the Women's League and the YWCA also used the Cottage and were soon joined by the Dean of Women who both worked and resided there. In 1924, the Cottage was renovated and became known as the Women's Building. It continued to serve as the only dormitory for women until the completion in 1934 of a larger women's residence hall. Since the 1930's, the Cottage has served as a center for various academic and administrative activities and is today the home of the Women Studies Program.

UWC has been supporting the efforts to renovate the Cottage since the announcement in 1992 that funds would have to be raised for serious corrective construction to insure a future for the building. Recently, a major contribution to the project was made by Commander James A. Woodruff, Jr., and that generous gift in honor of his deceased wife has resulted in the decision to name the cottage, "The Hazel Gates Woodruff Cottage for Women Studies".

Cottage No. 1, with its beautiful Victorian detailing, is certainly one of the most historically significant structures on the Boulder campus and is an important reminder to us all of the more than a century-long presence of women at the University of Colorado.

### COTTAGE NUMBER ONE RENOVATION PROJECT

During its 76-year history, the University Women's Club has supported the University during many times of urgent need. Macky Auditorium, the CU Libraries, Wardenburg, the Alumni Center, as well as our own scholarships and loans, are programs that have benefited from UWC financial support. Since 1992, the UWC has participated in plans to rescue and preserve the 1884 site of the first women's dormitory. The CU Foundation must succeed in securing gifts and pledges of one million dollars by the end of 1995 to ensure that the project goes forward.

In February, 1995, the UWC Board voted to offer our membership the opportunity to participate in raising a targeted amount of \$25,000 toward that goal. By reaching this target, we expect to be able to name some portion of the building. We ask each UWC member to make a gift or pledge. A \$100 gift per family would allow us to meet our goal, but we welcome contributions in any amount. The CU Foundation will keep track of Club members' contributions and will mail acknowledgements to each contributor. # MARGARET LOVE WHEELER WILLARD

The University Women's Club, originally named the Faculty Women's Club, was formed in 1919. Margaret Love Wheeler Willard was the first President of the Faculty Women's Club.

Margaret Love Wheeler was a native of Fort Smith, Arkansas, and a graduate of Wellesley College, class of 1898. She moved to Boulder with her family in 1906. In 1908, she earned a master's degree at the University of Colorado where she became an instructor in the English Department. Margaret Wheeler was "one of the most prominent in Boulder's social set." She was a member of the Fortnightly Club and Delta Gamma sorority.

In January, 1912, Margaret Wheeler, "a cultured and charming lady", married CU Professor James F. Willard, "the last bachelor at the University." After several recent weddings, James Willard was the remaining unmarried man on the CU faculty. The couple's romance was well known; they had been engaged for six months. It was even noted in a local newspaper's wedding announcement that there was speculation they were already secretly married. James Willard had been a member of the History Department faculty since 1906, and was appointed chairman in 1907. He was one of the most popular professors on campus.

In August, 1912, the Willards left for Europe on the first of several sabbatical trips to England. James Willard was a scholar of international reputation. One of his specialties was English medieval history. Margaret Willard assisted her husband in his research and conducted her own research on these trips. During one of their visits to England, Margaret Willard collected material for a book which she edited, entitled, Letters on the American Revolution of 1774-1776, published in 1925. Professor James Willard died in 1935. After his death, Margaret Willard assisted in the completion of his unfinished book, The English Government at Work 1327-1336. She was also credited with assistance in his research on the Pikes Peak gold rush and Willard's work on the Dictionary in America.

Margaret W. Willard was active in many civic and University organizations. From 1932-1936, she served as chairman of the Boulder County Child Welfare Association, an institution dedicated to aiding, "the mental, physical, and moral development of the children of Boulder." Among her collection of recipes was one entitled, "Creamed Chipped Beef for 40 Children". Mrs. Willard served as President of the Faculty Women's Club andwas a sponsor of the student organizatio. Mrs. Willard was also advisor to the CU chapter of Delta Gamma sorority from about 1930 to 1945. She was noted for her leadership during the World War II years in a letter written to her in 1942. "In these days, it is not a simple matter to find women who feel that they have the time to devote to sorority matters . . . " . Margaret Willard was a member of the Episcopal church and maintained her membership in the Fortnightly Club until her death in 1955.
