#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As President of the UWC it is my charge and that of my board to lead this club in an intelligent, sensitive, and new direction. I cannot profess to know what the founding women of this organization would have envisioned this new direction to be, but I feel that they would have sought the avenue that leads toward a social landscape sensitive to the struggles of women in society, particularly in the University setting. Attempting to bring the UWC into the new millennium is not an easy task. I began my term of office with a mental map of historical events and processes; a map strongly colored with tradition. In the quest for a new, healthy direction for the UWC. I hear the new member ask for answers to immediate concerns and she is at first impatient with the responses to her questions. Meanwhile, the older member enjoys volunteering her opinions. All dialogues across the generations initially seem one-sided, with each side resolutely grounded in a different time; liken the teenager and the parent. My own roots, being deeply grounded in tradition, hold that traditions are a tenet of any community - whether you call it "Club" or "Clan". I profoundly believe that a woman who desires to improve herself and her family by means of an education should be embraced and assisted in this direction by all women, especially the members of the UWC. Leisure time, as many of the founding women of our organization knew it, no longer exists. Social events such as tea parties and luncheons as experienced by Margaret Willard have gone forever - the cost of a "free" education. In most families both parents now work. Many times even the "combined income" is not sufficient to sustain the family. More often than we would like to believe, that "family" consists of a single parent household existing well below the poverty level. Women are returning to the University in greater numbers than ever before; financially it is difficult. The experiences of generations of women prove that education is the most effective manner in which to improve the economic position of their families. Those of us lucky enough to have time and money with which to enjoy "leisure time"should, therefore, feel the responsibility, yes even the duty, to help our fellow women. Through UWC activities we can help women to elevate themselves, experience a better life, and even enjoy an hour of leisure time. Support the UWC projects and fund-raisers; have a good time knowing that your activities will support scholarship. I firmly believe that the University Women's Club has found its direction for the new millennium by strengthening our economic base with a broader invitation for membership, by taking off the (white) gloves, and by reaching out to others through "Women Helping Women Through Scholarship".

#### Dear Members:







The University Women's Club of the University of Colorado is pleased to announce the 1997 recipients of the Margaret Willard Award. Named in honor of the first president of the UWC, this award recognizes women who are good role models, exercise great initiative in their professions, and who, by their exceptional accomplishments, bring honor to all women and to the University.

This year's honorees are *Mary Bonneville*, Professor Emerita of Molecular, Cellular, and Developmental Biology; *Zoya Popovic*, Associate Professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering; and *Angela Theiman*, a doctoral student in Anthropology. They will be recognized at the University Women's Club Honors Tea on May 6<sup>th</sup> at the University Residence, 3600 Caddo Parkway.

Professor Bonneville was one of a highly select group of scientists who established the MCDB Department. In addition to being one of the women pioneers in her field, her unique contributions have also been in the area of faculty government. Through her initiative, regulations have been formulated to help protect the status of professional women at the University.

Professor Popovic is an outstanding researcher and teacher. She has developed new laboratory courses and revised courses in electro-magnetics. She has received numerous awards from the National Science Foundation, and from comparable institutes in France, Yugoslavia and Japan.
