MARGARET WILLARD AWARD





MARGARET WILLARD AWARD RECIPIENTS ANNOUNCED

The University Women's Club of the University of Colorado is pleased to announce the 1998 recipients of the Margaret Willard Award. Named in honor of the first president of the UWC, this award recognizes women who are exemplary role models, exercise great initiative in their professions, and who, by their exceptional accomplishments, bring honor to all women and to the University.

This year's honorees are *Kristi S. Anseth*, Assistant Professor of Chemical Engineering; and *Katherine Moerke*, Director of the CU-Boulder Women's Resource Center. They will be recognized at the University Women's Club Honors Reception on May 5th at the University Residence, 3600 Caddo Parkway.

Professor Anseth, a graduate of Purdue, completed her graduate work at CU in 1994. She joined the faculty in 1996, after spending a postdoctoral year at MIT. As one of the nominating letters stated, "It is extremely rare to hire a graduate student from the same department as a faculty member. However, Kristi's contributions and potential both in research and teaching were so outstanding that we made an exception in her case." She maintained a perfect grade point average throughout all her schooling. Based upon her Ph.D. research (which resulted in 17 publications and six proceedings), she won several awards including the Outstanding Graduate Student Award from the Material Research Society, a University of Colorado Graduate Research and Creative Work Award, and the American Chemical Society's Unilever Award for the most outstanding Ph.D. thesis in the nation in the field of polymers. She was one of three finalists for the 1994-95 International Dissertation Award, given only once every two years in all fields in the world. In only two years, she has published 31 peer-reviewed research articles and is the recipient of a Packard Fellowship - one of only ten awarded nationally each year for all of science and engineering. This fellowship is a five-year, \$500,000 unrestricted research grant. In addition, she is a National Science Foundation Fellow and a DuPont Fellow. As unparalleled as she is a researcher, Professor Anseth is equally talented as an educator and classroom teacher. She currently directs six graduate students and works with eight undergraduates on individual research projects. Students comment that they are fortunate to have a role model who performs at an exceptional level professionally and yet still cares so deeply for them. No wonder she consistently has obtained excellen teaching evaluations from her students. Oh, and one final note - while at Purdue, she was named an Academic All-American in College Basketball!

Described as an organizer, motivator, strategizer and source of continuous energy, *Katherine Moerke* was appointed the first director of the Women's Resource Center (WRC) in the summer of 1994. Under Ms. Moerke's skillful tute-lage, what began as a student initiative (with a desk in a back room of the UMC and supported only by student fees), has emerged as a thriving Resource Center under student government which serves hundreds of students and members of the CU-Boulder community each month - no small feat given the budget constraints of the past few years! Through her efforts, programs have been created that focus on women's issues, a volunteer force has been established to staff the center, and campus-wide support for the Center generated. Students state that the Center provides them a place where they can be themselves as well as make a useful contribution. In addition, Ms. Moerke has been very active in promoting networking and alliance opportunities for women faculty and staff on campus. Her presence has enhanced student experience at CU as well as the quality of life for women on the Boulder campus. Her leadership, dedication to women's rights, and extraordinary abilities as director of the WRC serve as an inspiration and role model for all. Ms. Moerke will attend law school this fall, and, as one nominator put it: "She has done a splendid job as the initial director (of the WRC) and leaves a solid legacy."
