

October Lecture Dinner (continued)

Dr. Lon Abbott is a Senior Instructor in the CU Geological Sciences Department. In addition to teaching classes and publishing scientific articles, Dr. Abbott strives to contribute to public understanding of and appreciation for geologic processes, the deep history of the planet, and the significance of geology in our everyday lives.

He has published three geology books and over 35 articles intended for a general audience and he's given dozens of public presentations about Colorado's geology.

Dr. Abbott's research is focused on how mountains are built and sculpted into the beautiful landscapes we enjoy today. His current research foci are deciphering the geologic history of Colorado's Rocky Mountains and the adjacent Colorado Plateau and on understanding when and why Australia's Great Escarpment formed.

His presentation will take us on a journey through Colorado's geologic history from the formation of the state's first continental crust 1700 *million* years ago right up to today. We'll trace the rise and fall of several mountain ranges, watch deserts and seas encroach on the state and then recede, and get to know some of Colorado's early inhabitants. We'll pay special attention to the sequence of events that produced the Flatirons, Boulder's glorious backdrop.

President's Message



Greetings and welcome to another year of fun and enlightening University Women's Club activities. In this issue of *Messages* you will find information about the upcoming Membership Tea, Lecture Luncheons and Dinner, Opera Brunch, and Interest Groups. I hope you will be pleased and will attend as many events as you can. Please note the change in this year's schedule. There are NO UWC EVENTS in DECEMBER. There is a Lecture Luncheon in January.

The University Women's Club is almost 100 years old. It grew out of a Faculty Women's Club at the University of Colorado, which had its first meeting on December 12, 1919, at the Norlin home. Geroge Norlin was the fifth president of CU, and his wife hosted the meeting. At first membership was limited to faculty wives and female faculty members. Today the UWC is open to any woman who is a member or friend of the University.

Many aspects of the Club have changed over the years and some were documented in a monograph published on the 75th anniversary. Although the centennial is two years away, the UWC needs to start planning for the event. In particular, if we want to publish a centennial monograph, work should begin this year to allow sufficient time to collect information. If you are interested in being part of a group researching the last twenty-five years of the Club's activities, please let me know. The UWC has undertaken a number of service projects over the years starting with a milk fund for school children. Today our primary service activity is providing scholarships to nontraditional students. In recognition of its importance, **the Board has voted to increase dues to \$35**, of which \$5 will automatically go towards the Scholarship Fund. That will not be enough, however, to provide the support to students that we would like to provide, and I encourage you to continue to give as generously as you can and have in the past to the fund.

We are so looking forward to continuing our long-held tradition of providing scholarships to deserving students at CU! Within the past three years we have realized that while the cost of tuition had soared, the size of the scholarships we were giving had not. Tell Me More—about Anna Boyd



Anna Boyd was a UWC Scholarship winner in 2013-14. At that time, she had already demonstrated that she was a young woman with a mission. Her goal was to help other young women as they struggled with emotional issues and worked on recovery from traumatic experiences. Her work with teenage girls as a field guide for a wilderness therapy program, guiding students through the outdoors and towards their therapeutic outcomes, spurred Anna on to pursue her education in Psychology and Women and Gender Studies at CU Boulder. As she honed her skills in conflict resolution and communication, her focus shifted towards how to help people in a proactive, rather than a reactive, manner.

Since her graduation in 2015 Anna has continued to work toward her goal through employment, further education, community involvement and entrepreneurial enterprise. She is currently finishing up a Masters of Professional Studies in the Psychology of Leadership at Work from Penn State. She is employed as a leadership development consultant for Fortune 500 organizations through Action Learning Associates. She is an adjunct instructor at Colorado Mountain College, and has her own consulting business, Empowered Solutions Colorado, LLC. Her focus is helping women and girls reach leadership positions.

Empowered Solutions provides personal and business solutions to help individuals become more empowered participants in their own lives. It specializes in working with women and marginalized populations. Empowered Solutions provides team building workshops, conflict resolution, and programs for women's leadership, including tips on how to project confidence and to increase self-awareness. Anna was recently selected to serve as a board member for the non-profit organization ElevateHER, based in Buena Vista, CO. ElevateHER brings outdoor adventure to girls who might generally not have access to it due to financial constraints. 

A Brief Geological History of Colorado: **How Did the Flatirons Form?**

Speaker: Lon Abbott PhD

Join us for an evening lecture with Dr. Lon Abbott. The doors open at 5:30 p.m. at the Glenn Miller Ballroom. There will be a cash bar in addition to dinner.

Dr. Lon Abbott is a Senior Instructor in the CU Geological Sciences Department. In addition to teaching classes and publishing scientific articles, Dr. Abbott strives to contribute to public understanding of and appreciation for geologic processes, the deep history of the planet, and the significance of geology in our everyday lives.

He has published three geology books and over 35 articles intended for a general audience, and he has given dozens of public presentations about Colorado's geology.

Dr. Abbott's research is focused on how mountains are built and sculpted into the beautiful landscapes we enjoy today. His current research foci are deciphering the geologic history of Colorado's Rocky Mountains and the adjacent Colorado Plateau and on understanding when and why Australia's Great Escarpment formed.

His presentation will take us on a journey through Colorado's geologic history from the formation of the state's first continental crust 1700 million years ago right up to today. We will trace the rise and fall of several mountain ranges, watch deserts and seas encroach on the state and then recede, and get to know some of Colorado's early inhabitants. We will pay special attention to the sequence of events that produced the Flatirons, Boulder's glorious backdrop.

President's Message



During this time of membership renewal as we approach our centennial, it seems appropriate to review the changes in eligibility for membership in the Club that have occurred over the last 98 years. Although the Club was founded in 1919, the first constitution was not written until 1924 at which time only faculty wives and female faculty members were eligible.

Remember the original name of the Club was the Faculty Women's Club. Fifteen years later, in 1939, eligibility rules in the constitution were amended to include female librarians as long as they were in that position. The establishment of a Navy Japanese Language School at CU to help with the war effort in 1942 led to heated discussions on the Board about allowing the wives of the Language School faculty to join even though they were eligible. After much debate, they were accepted.

In the fifties, there were many discussions about eligibility for membership, especially concerning the wives of administrative and professional personnel and women who were administrators or professional personnel. Some administrators were accepted by exception. Eventually, in 1960, the wives of men with professional privileges and professional women were considered eligible followed a year later by accepting the wives of adjunct professors.

The 1960s and 1970s were times of unrest and disenchantment with authority and exclusivity, causing the Club to change its name to the University Women's Club and to open admission to the wives of any employees or persons connected with the University and any woman employed by or connected to the University. Boulder residents who had no formal connection to CU were still not eligible, but shortly before the 75th anniversary, in 1993-94, the Club was opened to "the wives of all persons affiliated with the University of Colorado and women faculty, staff administrators, alumni and <u>friends of the University of Colorado</u>." Today membership is open to "women who are friends or members of the University community."

This information is taken from the publication *From Year to Year*, a monograph created at the time of the 75th anniversary of the UWC and from discussions with Carol Kassoy and Karen Diamond. If you are interested in working on a similar publication for the centennial, please let me know.

Returning to the present day, Carol Etges and co-chair Merry Bullock have been working to revitalize our webpage (boulderuwc.org). I encourage you to visit it and provide them with your thoughts and suggestions. I also want to thank Lynne Barnett for arranging the stimulating lectures that we will have this year.

Tell Me More—about Boulder as a Wild Neighbors City



Most of us know that Boulder is a Sister City, partnering with eight cities worldwide with the idea that people worlds apart can form relationships that foster peace and prosperity. But did you know that Boulder is also a Wild Neighbors city?

While I surfed the internet to see what I should do about the raccoon family that has taken up residence under my deck, I discovered that Boulder, along with four other cities, was selected by the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) for a pilot program for determining the best ways to coexist with our wild neighbors. Boulder was selected because of its reputation for honoring the premise that wild animals have a right to live in our community and deserve respect and protection.

HSUS provides Wild Neighbors cities with professional training for community leaders, animal care and control agencies, and police; educational seminars for the public; and assistance in the implementation of humane management plans. Based on knowledge garnered from the five pilot cities, HSUS will develop a toolkit for other communities and will add twenty more Wild Neighbors cities over the next five years.

When we discover a wild animal in our home or shed, many of us believe the kindest thing is to trap the animal and set it free elsewhere, or block its entrance when the animal is away. Unfortunately, this is not the case. Studies show that in many cases the relocated animal dies in the unfamiliar area, and/or its babies die of starvation when the mother is unable to return to them.



So what should we do? For injured or orphaned wildlife, call Animal Control at 303-441-3333. For information about dealing with small wildlife, contact the Greenwood Rehabilitation Center at 303-545-5849 or Colorado Parks and Wildlife at 303-297-1192.

What will they tell you to do about a skunk in your garage, a squirrel in your chimney, or a baby bird that has fallen from its nest? Find the Humane Wildlife Resolution Conflict Guide here:



President's Message



Interest Groups are a vital part of the University Women's Club. We now have 26 groups, which, after some research, I believe is more than ever before. Granted seven of them are book groups and not unique activities, but it is still an impressive number of groups. The first Interest Group, whose existence was recorded in 1937, was a Drama Group that evidently gave performances for the entire Club. That group may have morphed into a Play Reading Group in 2002, and now we have two Readers' Theatre Groups.

A Newcomer's Group was started in the early 1940s and lasted until the 1970s. For a time it had officers and a program of its own. It was not connected to Boulder Newcomers Club.

Some groups that existed in the 1950s remain active today: the Garden Group, Music Group, and Bridge Group. Groups that existed in the 1960s that still continue today in some form are book groups, Needlecraft (sometimes listed as Sewing or Sewing, Knitting, Handicrafts), Out to Lunch (originally called International Foods and whose members cooked recipes from around the world, then listed as International Out to Lunch when they started to go to restaurants), and Walking. By the 1980s there were both Hiking and Walking groups as well as a French Conversation group. Hiking and French continue.

A Travel Group, the forerunner of Tea and Travel, existed from the 1960s until 2014. An Investments Group existed from at least 1981 to around 2012. Other groups that met for many years but no longer exist are Writing and Authorship, Art Forum, and Antiques. The latter two may have been absorbed by On the Road Again as they went to various places to see exhibits. Wine Tasting, Tennis, and German existed in the 1980s and 1990s.

I gleaned much of the above history from reading old *MESSAGES* and from our 75th Anniversary booklet *From Year to Year.* Kathleen Newton has agreed to head up the project of writing up the Club's history for our Centennial. If you are interested in participating, please let her know, <u>Kathleen_n@comcast.net</u> or 720-548-8661. If you have information about past Interest Groups and changes, please let me or Kathleen know. We should collect that information as part of our history.

Our current Interest Group chairs, Tamera Van Spriell and Linda Nordberg, suggested that the Club purchase liability insurance in case an unfortunate event happened at an Interest Group activity, such as a fall when hiking or biking, and the Club was subsequently sued. After some investigation and deliberation, the Board voted to purchase liability insurance, which will provide general liability coverage for all members of the Club when they are engaged in Club activities. If you have any questions about the insurance, please contact me. The Board is now discussing the issue of having members sign waivers. If you have an opinion about waivers, please let a Board member know.

Tell Me More—about Book Recommendations from our UWC Book Groups

A couple of years ago we published a list of books recommended by some of our book groups. We've been asked for a reprise. Following are some favorite **fictional** works recommended by our groups from last year's selections. Next month we'll publish some non-fiction selections. See the May 2015 issue of *MESSAGES* for the previous list. Remarks come mostly from the Boulder Public Library Catalog.

A Spool of Blue Thread by Anne Tyler

Here are four generations of Whitshanks. Brimming with all the insight, humor, and generosity of spirit that are the hallmarks of Anne Tyler's work, *A Spool of Blue Thread* tells a poignant yet unsentimental story in praise of family in all its emotional complexity.

Brave New World by Aldous Huxley

Huxley's story shows a futuristic World State where all emotion, love, art, and human individuality have been replaced by social stability. An ominous warning to the world's population, this literary classic makes us think.

Flight Behavior by Barbara Kingsolver

Kingsolver's riveting story concerns a young wife and mother on a failing farm in rural Tennessee who experiences something she cannot explain, and how her discovery energizes various competing factions--religious leaders, climate scientists, environmentalists, politicians--trapping her in the center of the conflict and ultimately opening up her world.

Homegoing by Yaa Gyasi

Homegoing begins with the story of two half-sisters, separated by forces beyond their control: one sold into slavery, the other married to a British slaver. It traces the generations of family who follow, as their destinies lead them through two continents and three hundred years of history, as the legacy of slavery is fully revealed in light of the present day.

Indian Summer by William Dean Howells

Written in 1886, this is one of the most charming and memorable romantic comedies in American literature. It tells of a season in the life of three gifted and well-meaning people against the backdrop of Florence. The brilliance of their repartee, and the accumulating burden of their mutual misunderstandings make for a comedy of errors that is as winning as it is wise.

Me Before You by JoJo Moyes

A woman takes a badly needed job working for ex-Master of the Universe Will Traynor, who is wheelchair bound after an accident. Will is acerbic, moody, bossy--but soon his happiness means more to Lou than she expected. When she learns that Will has shocking plans of his own, she sets out to show him that life is still worth living.

Pompeii by Robert Harris

When the aqueduct that brings fresh water to thousands of people around the bay of Naples fails, Roman engineer Marius Primus heads to the slopes of Mount Vesuvius to investigate, only to come face to face with an impending catastrophe.

The Amazing Adventures of Kavalier and Clay by Michael Chabon

The tragicomic adventures of a couple of boy geniuses reveal much about what happened to America in the middle of the twentieth century. This is a superb novel with epic sweep, spanning continents and eras.

The Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood

Set in the near future, this describes a monotheocracy that has reacted to social unrest and a sharply declining birthrate by reverting to, and going beyond, the repressive intolerance of the original Puritans. Funny, unexpected, horrifying, and altogether convincing.

The Storied Life of A J Fikry: A Novel by Gabrielle Zevin

This novel has humor, romance, a touch of suspense, but most of all love--love of books and bookish people and, really, all of humanity in its imperfect glory.



Both of our speakers are part of the Colorado Clinic.

According to the Colorado Clinic website, "Along with traditional pain management, new and cutting edge options are offered including regenerative medicine and stem cell injections, platelet rich plasma therapy, hormone replacement and more!" Dr. Feldman is Triple Board Certified in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, Pain Medicine, and Electrodiagnostic Medicine.

Again, per the Colorado Clinic website, "Over twenty exceptional therapies are available for all types of headaches including migraines, tension-type, cervicogenic, medication overuse headaches, and cluster headaches. The newest interventional procedures are offered, which include stem cell therapy and Botox therapy too." Dr. Da Silva is Board Certified in both Neurology and Headache Management, while also being an Assistant Clinical Professor at the University of Colorado.

President's Message



As you now have noticed, the December Lecture Luncheon, traditionally held in December, will be held in January. December is usually full of special activities and visits with family, and the Board thought moving the December luncheon to January might help reduce members' overcrowded December schedules. Please let a Board member know if you prefer a December or January luncheon – or, perhaps, would like to have both.

December used to be one of the busiest times for the University Women's Club. In the early days (the 1920s), the Club had a Christmas Party, which morphed into a Christmas Ball. In the late 1930s, the President of CU and the Regents asked the Faculty Women's Club (now UWC) to plan and organize a Christmas Party open to all employees of the University, paid for with University funds. It was one of the biggest social events of the year. The party was an elaborate affair held on several floors of the University Memorial Center. Games were played in the basement and there was dancing to a live orchestra

in the Glenn Miller Ballroom. Club members had the responsibility for planning the entire event, picking the orchestra, creating the decorations, and selecting the refreshments. The ballroom was transformed in accordance with a theme.

In September 1979, due to actions taken by the State Legislature, CU President Rautenstraus received notice that "The State fiscal rules specifically prohibit a Christmas party, dances or receptions sponsored with 'State funds' for its employees." So, after forty years, the Christmas Party was discontinued.

Eleven years later, in 1990, UWC Past President Marilee Dunn revived the tradition, and the Club held a Winter Party in the Glenn Miller ballroom with dancing, wine, and dessert. No longer a campus-wide party, invitations were sent just to UWC members and members of the Retired Faculty Association. Chancellor James Corbridge and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs Bruce Ekstrand contributed to the event because it promoted a feeling of community on the CU-Boulder campus. That year a local artist created a sculpture that was used as centerpiece and donated it to be auctioned off as a way to raise money for the UWC Scholarship Fund. The Party was attended by 230 guests.

The Club continued to hold elaborate, themed Winter Parties in the Glenn Miller Ballroom supported in part by the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor until 1996. In 1994 the theme was *Gaudy Night*, referring to Dorothy Sayers' masterpiece British mystery. Individuals were chosen to play the parts of her main characters, Lord Peter Wimsey and Harriet Vane.

In 1997 and 1998, even though the event was still supported by the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor, the venue was changed to the Broker Inn for reasons I could not discover. The venue was not large enough to meet the demand. In 1999-2000, the Winter Party was held in February at the Boulder Country Club. Interest had clearly waned as the event was cancelled the next year, revived again in February 2002, again at the Boulder Country Club with a cost of \$40 per person. That was the last UWC Winter Party.

If you are interested in the history of the UWC, please let Kathleen Newton know, as a group of members are organizing to research the Club's history in preparation for our centennial.

Tell Me More—about Happiness in Boulder and Ruth Wright

The November 2017 issue of National Geographic featured a long article by Dan Buettner on "The Search for Happiness" and the world's happiest places. The USA didn't make the cut for the top ten countries, but Boulder did come out on top within the USA.

Buettner outlines three types of happiness:

Pleasure: "Experienced happiness" or "positive affect" – enjoying living daily life to the fullest, measured by smiling, laughing, feeling joy.

Purpose: "Eudaimonic happiness" – a life of meaning measured by learning or doing something interesting.

Pride: "Life satisfaction" or "evaluative happiness" – a feeling of well-being. Using a self-rating of one's life on a scale of 0-10, 7 or higher is considered "thriving."

According to researchers, much of human happiness is driven by six factors: strong economic growth, healthy life expectancy, quality social relationships, generosity, trust, and the freedom to live the life that's right for you. The cultural values of the happiest places nurture this. Of 190 US communities, Boulder emerged with the highest level of happiness.

Buettner suggests that other communities "might do well to look to local bright spots to inform national policy." He listened to **Ruth Wright**, activist, former Colorado State Legislator, and **recipient of the UWC Margaret Willard Award in 2008-09**, about how to shape the community to support happiness.



Ruth Wright

Ruth Wright began her Boulder activist career in 1971 when she campaigned against high-rise buildings in downtown Boulder and was successful in limiting building heights to five stories. In the decades since, Boulder has promoted bike riding, established a progressive food policy, worked toward zero waste, and advocated renewable energy.

As activist, legislator, and citizen, Ruth Wright continues to serve as a champion for environment and to question the unquestioned virtue of development. For her "fun is getting things done."

Buettner sums up the "Boulder brand of happiness: a community of fit, successful, mission-driven people with a clear vision of the good life. Pleasure, purpose, pride – the three strands of happiness."



Margaret Willard Award

How many of you know who Margaret Willard was? Margaret Willard began her career as an English instructor at CU, wife of a CU history professor, and in 1919, she became the first president of an organization titled Faculty Women's Club, which has evolved into a more encompassing group, our University Women's Club. At first the original group concertrate on organizing social events for the campus community, but eventually they became involved in philanthropic matters.

By 1957, the group added fund-raising and expanded its philanthropic work by providing financial loans to women to help them continue their education. In 1982, the UWC began to give scholarships to nontraditional females. We continue this tradition and recently have included men for scholarship consideration. Since 1993, the UWC has presented the Margaret Willard Award to a woman or women who have exemplified the traits of our predecessors, and in doing so, honor all women.



Last year's Margaret Willard Award recipient was Tobey Bassoff, Principal of Ryan Elementary. (See the writeup on Boulderuwc.org/ Previous MESSAGES/May 2017.)

A few of the other winners include Stephanie Rudy, Becky Rosser, Val Havlick, Jennie Thompson, Carlen Penfold, Claudine Garby, Patricia Limerick, Virginia Patterson, and Ceal Barry (Colorado Women's Sports Hall of Fame.)



Ever Seen a Ghost? - Influence of Culture and Religion on Haunting as Related to the Writing of One Short Sleep Past

Speaker: Dr. Daphne Low: an author/publisher. She holds a Ph.D. in social/clinical psychology. She has practiced as a clinician in Chicago, and has taught social and cross-cultural psychology at the University of Montana, University Sains Malaysia, and Nanyang University in Singapore.

Dr. Low asks "Ever Seen a Ghost?" She will discuss the influence of culture and religion on *haunting* as it related to the writing of *One Short Sleep Past*. The book is a work of fiction set in the historic mining town of Leadville circa1890s and in today's Denver. The story is told in three voices, each a compelling narrative in the three intersecting lives, bridging a common bond across time and space.

President's Message



The University Women's Cub has supported the University of Colorado in a variety of ways since its inception. Last month I described some social activities the Club hosted for the campus community. In the past the UWC has also raised funds for building renovations. One outstanding example is the Club's contribution to the renovation of Cottage #1, now known as the Hazel Gates Woodruff Cottage.

Built in 1884-85 to provide housing for women students, Cottage #1, the "Ladies Cottage," provided unfurnished sleeping rooms for twelve women along with a bath and an office for a chaperone or house mother. The sleeping rooms were upstairs; downstairs contained a large kitchen, several parlors, and a large dining room. Soon the downstairs rooms were occupied by the Women's League, the Boulder YWCA (which was founded there), and the Dean of Women, who worked and resided there.

In 1924 the Cottage was renovated and became known as the Women's Building. Although sororities were established in the early 1900s, providing housing alternatives for women, Cottage #1 was the only women's dormitory at CU until 1934, when a larger residence hall was built. With the construction of the larger dormitory, the Woman's Building became a women's center, providing a focus for women's activities on the campus and community, and eventually housing CU's Department of Home Economics. It is currently the home of the Women and Gender Studies Program.

By the 1990s the Cottage was on the demolition list, which galvanized efforts to save it because of its historic significance and its beautiful Victorian detailing. In 1992 the UWC became involved in the rescue efforts and in 1995 conducted a fundraising campaign to support the million-dollar renovation. The Club raised nearly \$13,000. Some UWC contributions were made in honor of M. Helen Carpenter, and the Cottage has a M. Helen Carpenter Reading Room. Helen Carpenter was a member of the Club for at least 68 years, and the Club's 75th Anniversary Book *From Year to Year* contains some of her reminisces. She graduated from CU in 1922 and worked for the University for 46 years. Because she was staff, she was not eligible to join the Faculty Women's Club (our name at that time), but an exception was made and she was admitted to the Club in 1924.



In its thank you note for the UWC's efforts, the CU Foundation sent a letter stating "The overall contribution by the UWC to this project transcends a dollar amount. The outpouring of support for the Cottage renovation has been invaluable to our overall success. UWC members have served this project in a multitude of ways: as volunteers, as donors, as committee members, and as advocates. Your support of the restoration of this lovely building can be counted as yet another chapter in the chronicle of important contributions and service your organization has provided to the University over the last 77 years."

In our chronicle of the Club's onehundred-year history, we should document the contributions the UWC has made to CU. For example, it has also contributed to renovations of Macky

Tell Me More—Book Recommendations from the Book Groups

In November we published a list of fiction books recommended by some of our book groups. Following are some favorite **non-fiction** works recommended by our groups from last year's selections. Remarks come mostly from the Boulder Library Catalog.

BIOGRAPHY and MEMOIR:

Infidel by Avaan Hirsi Ali

In this profoundly affecting memoir, Ayaan Hirsi Ali tells her life story, from her traditional Muslim childhood in Somalia to her intellectual awakening in the Netherlands to her life under armed guard in the West.

Let's Not Go to the Dogs Tonight: An African Childhood by Alexandra Fuller

The author remembers her African childhood with visceral authenticity. Though it is a diary of an unruly life in an often inhospitable place, in wry and sometimes hilarious prose, she stares down disaster and looks back with rage and love at the life of an extraordinary family in an extraordinary time.

Thomas Jefferson: The Art of Power by Jon Meacham

In this magnificent biography, the Pulitzer Prize-winning author brings vividly to life an extraordinary man and his remarkable times. The book presents Jefferson the politician and president, a great and complex human being, forever engaged in the wars of his era. Philosophers think; politicians maneuver. Jefferson's genius was that he was both and could do both, often simultaneously. Such is the art of power.

Victoria the Queen by Julia Baird

An account of the life of the English monarch offers insight into the passionate and sensuous aspects of her character, placing her reign against a backdrop of dynamic world events while sharing insights into her relationship with Albert and her pivotal role in building the British empire.

Wild Swans: Three Daughters of China by Jung Chang

Chang recounts the evocative, unsettling, and insistently gripping story of how three generations of women in her family fared in the political maelstrom of China during the 20th century.

NON-FICTION

American Nations: A History of the Eleven Rival Regional Cultures of North America by Colin Woodward

An illuminating history of North America's eleven rival cultural regions that explodes the red state-blue state myth. He illustrates and explains why "American" values vary sharply from one region to another.

A Perfect Red: Empire, Espionage, and the Quest for the Color of Desire by Amy Butler Greenfield

A Perfect Red recounts the colorful history of cochineal, a legendary red dye that was once one of the world's most precious commodities. Desperate to find their own sources of the elusive dye, the English, French, Dutch, and other Europeans tried to crack the enigma of cochineal.

Heretic: Why Islam Needs a Reformation Now by Ayaan Hirsi Ali

In what is sure to be her most controversial book to date, Ayaan Hirsi Ali makes a powerful case that a religious Reformation is the only way to end the terrorism, sectarian warfare, and repression of women and minorities that each year claim thousands of lives throughout the Muslim world.

Soldier Girls by Helen Thorpe

Soldier Girls is a groundbreaking account of three women deployed to Afghanistan and Iraq, and how their military service affected their friendship, their personal lives, and their families.

The Invention of Nature: Alexander Von Humboldt's New World by Andrea Wulf

Alexander Von Humboldt (1769-1859), an intrepid explorer and famous scientist of his age, came up with a radical vision of nature, that it was a complex and interconnected global force and did not exist for man's use alone. Ironically, his ideas have become so accepted and widespread that he has been nearly forgotten. Now Andrea Wulf brings the man and his achievements back into focus: his investigation of wild environments around the world; his discoveries of similarities between climate zones on different continents; his prediction of human-induced climate change; his remarkable ability to fashion poetic narrative out of scientific observation; and his relationships with iconic figures such as Simon Bolivar and Thomas Jefferson.

The River of Doubt: Theodore Roosevelt's Darkest Journey by Candice Millard

At once an incredible adventure narrative and a penetrating biographical portrait, *The River of Doubt* is the true story of Theodore Roosevelt's harrowing exploration of one of the most dangerous rivers on earth. It is a black, uncharted tributary of the Amazon that snakes through one of the most treacherous jungles in the world. Roosevelt accomplished a feat so great that many at the time refused to believe it. In the process, he changed the map of the western hemisphere forever.







President's Message



"There is no better way of showing love and affection than sharing one's culinary art with friends."

That quote from the first cookbook, *International Recipes*, published by the University Women's Club in 1964 seems fitting for Valentine's Day. Five hundred copies were printed by the University of Colorado press and sold as Christmas gifts, Valentine's gifts, and at other times. As a result of those sales, \$200 was donated to the Women's Center. The book was approximately 30 pages long and had recipes from eight countries including India (Curried Chicken Balls), Greece (Abrak – lamb and rice in grape leaves), and France (Rock Cornish Hens with French Chestnut Stuffing).

A revised *International Foods Cook Book* was printed in 1965 and sold for \$2.00 per copy, with funds from those sales going to the Women's Center, the UWC Student Loan Fund, the Alumni Center and Wardenburg.

In 1979, Sheryl Kuempel and Nancy Cateora, who were members of both the University Women's Club and the Friends of the University of Colorado Libraries, dreamed of publishing a cookbook that would generate funds for CU libraries for years to come, and decided to implement their idea. They solicited recipe donations from members of those two organizations and also from non-members, creating a special brochure requesting recipe submissions. Specific instructions were given: "Be specific on seasonings, especially in amounts of fresh and dry." "Use brand names when including prepared products as part of your recipe." "Which wine do you prefer with this dish?" "What time of year are you most likely to serve this dish?" Recipes were accepted through the fall of 1979.

Then the testing began. During spring 1980, various Club members hosted Tasting-Testing luncheons and dinners. Guests were assigned recipes to make and bring that would be taste tested by all. The UWC newsletter (called MSages at the time) gives the impression that the events were enjoyable and very popular. They continued throughout the spring.

The typing, layout, and design of the cookbook was done by volunteers and *The Colorado Cookbook* was finally published in 1981. During the fall of 1981, UWC members contacted local book stores, kitchen and gourmet stores, and gift shops to ask them to sell the cookbook, and kept in contact with the stores to be sure there were enough books in stock. Books were also sold at special events. Sheryl and Nancy went around the state selling the cookbook. Fifty thousand copies of the first edition were sold in three printings. A second edition was published in 1993 and sold for \$17.95. Approximately 80,000 copies have been made at this point, and a few are still available for sale on the internet.

Online descriptions of the book state: "Here is an imaginative collection of 662 recipes that have proven successful at all altitudes! In a step-by-step format, *The Colorado Cookbook* covers everything from treasured family dishes to exciting foreign fare. Presenting nutritional analysis, cooking and preparation times, and 18 full-color photos of Colorado's beauty, this one-of-a-kind cookbook is a winner for all culinary skills and life-styles."

The UWC Centennial History Committee is in the process of determining the amount of money this immense effort has generated for the libraries at CU.

Tell Me More— about Snow Making

For more than 70 years commercial companies have been using cloud seeding to produce snow, but, outside of the laboratory, there has been no reliable method to measure the effectiveness of their weather modification techniques. Now, thanks to a CU Boulder team partnered with researchers from Illinois and Indiana, there is scientific proof that cloud seeding works.

Back in the 1940's, atmospheric scientist Bernard Vonnegut discovered he could make snow in the lab using particles of silver iodide on clouds of cold water vapor. Outside the lab, particles of silver iodide are projected into clouds causing the moisture to create ice crystals that grow until they are large enough and heavy enough to fall as snow.

Katja Friedrich, Assistant Professor of the Department of Atmospheric and Oceanic Sciences at CU, is in charge of CU's part of the project with the great acronym SNOWIE, Seeded and Natural Orographic Wintertime Clouds – the Idaho Experiment. This is a three-year program funded by the National Science Foundation and Idaho Power. Friedrich says "The experiment will provide new insights into the atmospheric conditions needed for effective seeding of mountain clouds, building the scientific foundation

for weather modification as a tool for precipitation enhancement."

When the cloud conditions were right (temperatures between 0°C and 15°C), the SNOWIE team launched two small airplanes into the clouds. One airplane was responsible for spreading silver iodide, the other responsible for measuring changes. In January, Friedrich and her colleagues reported in the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*, "The radar can only see [water] particles that are big enough and these clouds had tiny droplets not detectable by radar. Suddenly we saw lines appear. It was really astonishing." The clouds' water particles were getting bigger as they hit the silver iodide and froze. Within a few hours they had grown from a few microns to 8 millimeters in diameter, heavy enough to fall as snow.

In Colorado a Weather Modification Program is administered by Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB). Cloud seeding is the primary weather modification activity recognized by this organization. Most of the projects in Colorado have a goal of snowpack augmentation in order to mitigate the drought conditions that have become significant since the early 2000s. The \$1 million weather modification program is funded partially by the CWCB through grants, partially by water providers, and partially by the ski resorts whose livelihood depends on an adequate snow pack.

In the Central Colorado Mountains River Basin, *Western Weather Consultants* operates about 36 cloud seeding generators which send plumes of silver iodide into the clouds when the right conditions exist. Larry Hjermstad, director of the company, has said "If we were able to do this over the entire state with all the mountain ranges, we could add the [water] equivalent of one entire river, [but] people are still skeptical."

Now that SNOWIE will be able to provide data, we may be able to determine if this is an attainable goal.

Fun Fact: Bernard Vonnegut was the brother of novelist Kurt Vonnegut. The fictional "ice-nine" in Kurt Vonnegut's novel *Cat's Cradle* was partially inspired by his brother's discovery.

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



President's Message



Our publications state that the University Women's Club was founded in part "to provide service to the University and to the Boulder community."

Over our almost 100 years, the Club has provided an incredible amount of service to the University. Some examples: in the early years, the Club organized elaborate Christmas parties to bring the university community together. *The Colorado Cookbook* published in 1981, which I wrote about last month, generated money for Norlin Library. In 1987 the Club hosted a benefit dinner raising \$2,000 for the University Artist Series. At that benefit, sixty people enjoyed a Hungarian dinner prepared by members of the Club followed by a concert by the Takacs Quartet. For three years, 2004-05 to 2006-07, the UWC had an outreach program, *Living in the USA*, designed to help international women who were students, wives of students, or visiting faculty adapt to life in Boulder. We plan to describe other examples in our centennial publication *Celebrating One Hundred Years*.

While UWC's service to the University has been substantial, service to the Boulder community has not been or has not been documented. A milk fund for school children is the first reported service project not connected with CU. In 1948 the UWC Social Service Committee made 20 hospital gowns, 150 cancer bandages, and curtains for City Hospital. In the 1950s they sewed for the City Welfare Board and made 12 dolls for the Tuberculosis Ward of Denver General Hospital. A frequent community service was baking cookies for the Meals on Wheels Program. Four volunteers per month baked three dozen cookies each, "omitting nuts and not making the cookies too chewy."

For many years the Club had a Service Projects chair who coordinated service activities. Service opportunities were listed in the September newsletter, and there was a service project table at the fall Membership Event. Volunteer opportunities at the Boulder History Museum, the Colorado Music Festival, Boulder Reads! and Emergency Family Assistance were listed along with other opportunities. However, it seemed that few members volunteered through the Club.

The Service position disappeared from the Board in 2005-06 but was revived in 2010-11. During that year the UWC organized several service projects for the Boulder community where UWC members participated as a group; the response was not strong. To find out why, in 2011 the UWC conducted a survey asking members about service. Over a third of UWC members responded. Only 5% considered the UWC an important referral source for service projects, and only 8% considered it important to volunteer with other UWC members on a group project. However, 58% were involved with volunteer activities outside of UWC. It seems that many UWC members engage in volunteer activities, but not through the Club!

The Board is currently considering some changes to the Constitution and Bylaws to make them reflect our current processes and may propose that the current objective or mission of promoting service to the community be deleted.

Aside from the service of annually providing scholarships for students, the Club does not at this time promote other service to the University. However, as I wrote above, our achievements in that area are strong. The UWC Centennial History Committee and Board are formulating a **survey**, which will be sent to you in the near future. It hopes to contrast the results with a survey conducted 25 years ago. One question may ask about your interest in service to CU. I encourage you to respond to the survey both to help us improve as an organization and to provide us with results that may show how we have changed over the last 25 years.

Tell Me More— about Boulder County CareConnect



Boulder County CareConnect (BCCC) <u>www.careconnectbc.org</u> provides volunteer-powered services to adults 60+ in Boulder County. In addition to its five basic programs, BCCC is the local hub for the national RSVP 55+ volunteer program.

Adults 60 years of age and older represent the fastest growing segment of the Boulder population. As of 2015, 19% (60,000) of Boulder County's residents fell into this age cohort. By 2040 forecasts suggest this group will account for 25% of our population.

Services

BCCC's programs are **provided at no charge**, though donations are welcome. Service programs include:

Carry Out Caravan. Volunteers take weekly phone-in grocery orders, shop at King Soopers, and deliver these groceries to clients' homes. Clients are responsible for payment of their groceries.

Medical Mobility. Volunteers use their personal vehicles to escort senior clients to and from medical appointments. Medical Mobility is provided in partnership with *Via Mobility Services*.

Fix-lt. Experienced volunteers provide minor home repairs including grab bar installation, walker and wheelchair repair, installation of smoke detectors, etc.

Yard busters. Volunteers provide one time cleanup in the summer.

Ice busters. Volunteers shovel sidewalks in winter. Currently we have more requests than volunteers.

Centennial History Book



Meet the Recipient of the Margaret Willard Award



Karon Johnson

The University Women's Club is proud to announce that Karon Johnson has been selected as the recipient of the Margaret Willard Award for 2018. She will receive this award at the UWC Honors Reception on May 8.

Karon received her Bachelor of Arts from SUNY Buffalo and her Master of Science in Education from CU-Boulder. Her professional life was dedicated to service in education, particularly to underrepresented populations and to low income students. Karon was an instructor in an Urban League Training Program which placed women receiving welfare into entry level jobs. At CU Boulder she coordinated programs for the American Indian Science and Engineering Society whose mission is to increase science and engineering education opportunities for Native Americans.

Karon was employed in the Financial Aid Office at CU and served as Student-employment Coordinator, Scholarship Coordinator, and at the time of her retirement, held the position of Director of Student Financial Aid.

She served as President of the state Colorado Association of Financial Administrators and coordinated College Goal Sunday, an annual statewide event dedicated to helping students and their families complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Several years ago, Karon was honored with a scholarship in her name from funds provided by an individual grateful for her assistance in the Financial Aid Office. The KARON JOHNSON SCHOLARSHIP is awarded annually to a deserving needy student.

In addition to her dedication and leadership in her professional life, Karon served as an avid volunteer in the Boulder community. She served on the boards of the YWCA, Shakespeare Garden Club, Colorado Shakespeare Guild, and the Mary Sandoe House for Assisted Living, where she served as president.

Retirement has provided Karon even more service opportunities. She is a weekly volunteer at the Sister Carmen Community Center Food Bank and at Boulder County Care Connect where she assists homebound senior citizens with their weekly shopping. Additionally, she has served as Crop Walk coordinator, as a volunteer at Bridge House and Attention Homes, and participated in three tours to New Orleans to help rebuild after the devastation of Hurricane Katrina.

Karon is a very active UWC member and over the years has found the time to serve as President, Program Chair, *MESSAGES* Editor, Scholarship Committee Chair, Scholarship Luncheon Chair, Advisory Planning/Parliamentarian, and on many ad hoc committees.

Karon has enhanced the quality of life for both women and men on the CU campus, UWC members, and in the Boulder community. She is an exceptional role model and brings honor to all women and to the University/Boulder community through her accomplishments. And besides that, she hits a long, straight, and wicked golf shot.

President's Message



UWC's Fashion Shows

Until the 1990s the University Women's Club did not have a lecture luncheon series as we do today. Instead a Program Chair would organize a variety of activities. In addition to a possible lecture by a CU professor, a musical event might be presented by the UWC Music Group, an artist might discuss his or her work, or a tour of a new campus facility arranged.

As Program Chair in 1956-57, Ann Martin wanted to have a fashion show to increase attendance at spring events. She initially met with resistance as members thought a fashion show was "too commercial" for the Club and that the event would be seen as endorsing a particular store, but she persisted even though she could not find an appropriate store in Boulder. She decided to work with Neusteters in Denver. The Club's first fashion show was on March 28, 1957.

Three hundred and seventy-five women in hats and gloves reviewed the latest fashions modeled by ten faculty wives. Because of its success, the fashion show became an annual event. There was no charge for the show in the early years, but eventually it became a spring fund-raising event, and in some years was a musical event rather than a fashion show.

All fashion shows had a theme. The March 18, 1980 show was "Around the World in Fashion and Fabric." It featured costumes collected by Dorothy Knop of Colorado Springs and modeled by international students on the Boulder campus. Fifteen costumes were presented including those of a Guatemalan peasant, a Kenyan woman in a Khanga, and a Thai concubine. Knop had batiks, silks, and Guatemalan textiles on sale during the show. In addition, ensembles designed by Lorraine of Denver using Knop's imported fabrics were modeled by faculty wives and CU staff and were for sale after the show. The goal was to raise \$3,000 for the purchase of books for the Norlin Library. There were also a dozen door prizes from local merchants.

The April 20, 1993 show, "Fashions from Boudoir to Boardroom" featured men's as well as women's clothing and lingerie. In thirteen scenes, a fashion show story captured "a day in the life of contemporary man and woman" starting with an opening boudoir scene featuring lingerie and men's robes to a final scene of evening wear. Eleven women, seven men, and a French poodle modeled fashions from Christina's Lingerie, the Velvet Slipper, Kinsley & Co., and La Place de Jo in Estes Park. Ann Martin, at 79, was one of the models and two other models were CU Regents. The event in the UMC Glenn Miller Ballroom was attended by 274 people.

To celebrate the 75th Anniversary, on April 19, 1994, the Club presented "*RAZMATAZZ* – 75 Years of Fashion in Boulder." Working with the Boulder History Museum, Boutique deLorimier, Dolan's Formal Wear, MAX Clothing Store, and J. Pitner Weekends, twenty-seven models, including men, exhibited fashions through the decades. A script was written and appropriate props were chosen. Proceeds were for the benefit of the UWC Scholarship Fund. Again there were door prizes and the grand prize was a pair of round trip air tickets to anywhere in the USA.

The May 4,1999 fashion show explained "How the West Was Really Won: A Tribute to Colorado Women." Fashions from the Trunk of Molly Brown were modeled and displays from the Women of the West Museum exhibited. Crestview students presented "Living Legends in Colorado History." Silent auction choices included jewelry, clothing, and Celebrity Luncheons with Chancellor Richard Byyny, President John Buechner, Professor Patty Limerick, and Physics Professor John Taylor. Proceeds went to the UWC Scholarship Fund.

I hope you enjoyed this year's fashion show at the April Scholarship Luncheon and all the other activities offered by the Club.

Tell Me More— about Food Waste and Hunger



In the past few weeks I've received two mailings with the title "Food for Thought" – one from Western Disposal Services, the other from Community Food Share. I found the information provided in these mailings to be quite shocking. I knew that in America we waste food, and I knew that in America we have way more "food insecure" people than a rich country like ours should have, but the extent of the waste and the numbers of the hungry took me aback.

Fully **40%** of the food produced in the USA goes uneaten. Waste is built into our food chain where 30% of produce is left to rot on the farm because it doesn't meet our standards for fruit and vegetable beauty. Yet somewhere between one in five and one in ten of our neighbors lacks consistent access to adequate food. Every single food insecure American could be fed if we captured one third of the food we waste.

There are many organizations dedicated to reducing waste and feeding the hungry. Denver based We Don't Waste (www.wedontwaste.org) connects food donors with community-based agencies that feed the hungry. Community Food Share, a member of Feeding America, rescues 7 tons of safe surplus food every day for redistribution to the hungry in Boulder and Broomfield Counties. They provided 10,000,000 meals last year.

But what can we, as individuals, do? Statistically, 43% of the waste comes from our homes and from us, as consumers. We can reduce our waste by more careful planning and "rescuing" our own food – milk is still safe 7 days beyond its "best by" date, eggs for 21 days, deli sliced meats for 3 days. Go to www.savethefood.com for tips on planning, storage, freezing, cooking with leftovers, and more. You can spend a LONG TIME on this site.



Do you have a garden? You can "grow a row for Community Food Share." Pledge to do this and in partnership with Boulder County Master Gardeners, Community Food Share will provide you with informational starter packets and garden tips. Email them at gardenshare@communityfoodshare.org to pledge.

No garden of your own? You can sign up for a 1-3 hour shift of gleaning weekdays and weekends through October. You'll help plant and pick fresh produce that will be donated to Community Food Share. Call Brianna Nash at (303) 525-3491 or use the gardenshare email above.

Not a gardener at all? You can volunteer to be a greeter at King Soopers in Longmont, Louisville, Lafayette, and Gunbarrel during the Hunger Hurts the Whole Community Food & Fund Drive May 4 – May 6. Sign up at www.communityfoodshare.org/hungerhurts.


